We had a busy and eventful summer where we set up our stall at various events. The first was a Garden Open Day at White Cliff Manor not long after followed by Swanage Cottage Hospital to help celebrate the opening of a new garden social area. Then at Kingston Garden Open Day at the invitation of Mr. & Mrs. Fry who later presented a very generous cheque for £1000 from their proceeds to our chairman Bob Walters at Greengage.

FOOD BANK STORE

Together they have been a very welcome addition on Sunday mornings. Martin has been a proactive visitor greeter. He released our occasionally used British Sign Language Tablet which has several sign language trail videos on it. This enabled some deaf visitors to make the most of their visit. The duo has stepped into the Sunday



morning slot that had been covered for many years by Margaret Elshaw whom recently passed away after being an FoD for over two decades. Indeed, she did the last ever Learning Centre Counter duty and first ever Castle counter duty!

Hereford Cattle News

Some of you may have noticed the absence of the cattle. Well, they have been grazing Jack Baiss Meadow which has no public access and is adjacent to the Dorset Wildlife Trust's Townsend Reserve. Six cattle currently on Townsend will join the Durlston herd bringing the total to 45 cattle. This has enabled us to make progress in tackling a water trough associated leak. Tom is leading on these investigations, with support, and two additional stop cocks have been installed. Soon the cattle will be grazing the reclaimed landfill site and adjacent meadow. Eventually we will bring them onto the Warren, but as usual we will keep them off the public footpath by installing a temporary electric fence. Hopefully, we will not need to have them grazing Lighthouse Field until the new year.

Sustainability Project: Would you like to help?

One of the original aims of our Swanage Community Defibrillator Partnership in 2015 was to ensure SUSTAINABILITY of the project.

Regular monitoring and maintenance of all the equipment, including the cabinets and defibrillators is undertaken on a fortnightly basis by our team of Guardians, reporting back to a central point, with defib batteries and pads being replaced when required With our now extensive fleet of defibrillators (almost 40) replacement costs are expensive. We are therefore very grateful to the Swanage Carnival Committee who chose SCDP as a beneficiary from this year's successful carnival week and awarded the project £1000. SCDP has also been chosen as one of the 3 Co-op local Community Funds to benefit in the next twelve months.

This support will also be welcome as we are required to update some of the defib. devices which have been recalled for software modification. As we have so many devices we have been able to request the attendance of a Medical engineer to the area who will be visiting in late November to do the work with Ian Brown and Kyle Hickman, both Founder SCDP members and who have taken leave to undertake the tasks -thank you both. The work may mean that some devices are taken out of service temporarily but the local Ambulance trust will be advised.

The whole SCDP team works hard to maintain this much needed service and ensure its future viability. Thank you to everyone involved.

Latest News from Corfe Castle Parish Council

Budget 2023 / 24 – It is that time of year again when Corfe Castle Parish Council start to consider the future financial demands for the parish. This month saw a report presented to council which included a 0% increase in Precept. Corfe Castle Parish Council, understand what impact the cost-of-living crisis is having for some of our residents and therefore our aim is to not make times harder than they already are. A final report will be presented to Council in the December meeting.

Gods Acre Rules and Regulations – Following the adoption of the new Rules and Regulations document for Gods Acre Cemetery, Corfe Castle Parish Council will in early 2023, be carrying out a clearance within Gods Acre of any item which is deemed to be in breach of these rules. All items will be placed to one side near the pedestrian entrance in the new extension area for the

period of one month before being disposed of.

Bus Stop – Corfe Castle Parish Council, were recently asked to consider asking Dorset Council to move a bus stop in Kingston. The change in location to just outside the Kingston Courtyard Centre, would mean visitors and local residents working at the Centre, would not have to walk down the road, daytime or night-time, when visiting / going to work at the Courtyard Centre. Corfe Castle Parish Council agreed to support the idea in principle subject to a safe location being determined by Dorset Council.

Corfe Castle Youth Club – Corfe Castle Parish Council, approved a Memorandum of Understanding between Purbeck Youth & Community Foundation and the Parish Council which sees the Council assisting financially to enable the club to run for this academic year.

Civility & Respect – Corfe Castle Parish Council agreed to take the **NALC Civility & Respect Pledge**. The pledge means: * Council agree that it will treat all councillors, clerk and all employees, members of the public, representatives of partner organisations and volunteers with civility and respect in their role. * Council has put in place a training programme for councillors and staff. * Council has signed up to Code of Conduct for councillor. * Council has good governance arrangements in place including, staff contracts, and Dignity at Work Policy. *Council will commit to seeking professional help at early stages should civility and respect issues arise.* Council will commit to calling out bullying and harassment if and when it happens. * Council will continue to learn from best practice in the sector and aspire to being a role model / champion council e.g., via Local Council Award Scheme & *Council supports the continued lobbying for the change in legislation to support the Civility and Respect Pledge including sanctions for elected members where appropriate.

Out of Hours Service. – In October Dorset Council changed the way they provide out of hours services. This service is no longer being contracted out to agencies and is being handled in-house.

West Street Road Works – The works planned for the 1st November 2022, were delayed due to health and safety reasons. Dorset Council is now considering if the works should take place at night.

Temporary Traffic Lights – The work being carried out between Castle view & the Norden roundabout is to replace a manhole cover by BT Open Reach. When BT Open Reach went to replace a manhole cover they discovered the chamber underneath had collapsed. Dorset Council have now requested BT Open Reach in daylight hours use manual stop-go boards so there should be better control of traffic.

Community & cultural organisation. – A new funding round for community and cultural organisations is open now. The focus for the funding is cost of living and warm spaces. Funding is up to max of £5,000. More details can be found on the Dorset Council website.

Sofa sessions – Dorset Councillors have taken to the streets armed with a sofa to speak face-to-face with residents. Four 'sofa sessions' were held in town centres across Dorset to allow councillors and officials to hear what matters most within communities.

Balancing Access with Impact



The volumes of people wanting and needing to spend time in nature, whether they live in Purbeck, BCP or from further afield is plenty. The impact of these visits upon people who don't live here can be easily missed or dismissed. We forget that 250 years ago more or less everyone's ancestors (regardless of whether they were born here or abroad) lived rural existences - no doubt incredibly tough, but also lives lived within nature. The night sky, fresh air, wildlife and the communal experiences that came with them, were day to day. Now, for most people, they are lucky if they find the time within a week to have some time in nature. In the late Victorian times organisations such as the National Trust were born... as a way of providing urban folk access to their rural routes (often in a fairly patrician way too).

What is interesting is that as more recent studies try to measure connectedness with nature (see RSPB and National Trust studies) is that urban children are found to be more connected to nature than rural children. Proximity to nature doesn't equate to better access to it, or increased value of it.



In Purbeck, a place where so many come and have life-changing experiences in amazing landscapes, some of our children do not 'even' go to the beach. We need to try to change that. We also, at a time when there are so many other social problems negatively impacting individuals, need to recognise it isn't top of the hierarchy of needs. But it is close to the top as for many, going for a walk/cycle/swim doesn't need to cost much and is a tonic that helps them face up to those social problems directly.

There are many barriers between children and nature, and no one person or organisation can remove them for everyone, but we can be curious and start to make a difference. This year we're working with both St Marks School and MyTime Young Carers to help overcome some of the barriers that their cohorts face...

We also, of course, need to balance access with impact - everyone being everywhere all of the time won't be great for nature or people. The work to bring together the Purbeck Heaths National Nature Reserve enables us to try to reduce the impacts of people upon nature (whether that is creating a fenced out enclosure for winter waders at Shell Bay or rationalising roadside car parking, through to ensuring there is a well-planned fire strategy so that as and when fires occur they are not catastrophic). It can also mean we can try to improve experiences too... white tailed eagles, ospreys, flocks of marsh harriers and spoonbills. Purbeck is becoming wilder, better for nature and hopefully better for people too.

Fake Santander email

Lots of people online have been flagging a fake Santander mobile banking email. The email impersonates Santander's branding and gives you a sense of urgency regarding your access to banking services, to pressure you into giving away data. Over the past week, use of the search term 'Santander email scams' has increased by more than 5000%, showing the spike in people being targeted with this new scam.

British Gas email scam offering a fake energy refund

Scammers are impersonating British Gas with fake emails tempting recipients to click a link to get a fake energy refund. Although the email looks legitimate, it addresses you by your email address and not your name. This is a potential giveaway that it's from a fraudster.

Premium rate number scams

This scam tries to trick people who are searching online for telephone numbers of government advice services. It works by displaying an advert for the phone number of the relevant government advice line.

But the sting is that you'll be charged a premium for using this advertised telephone number – in some cases, as much as £20 or £30 a call. You are put through to the right advice line, but you pay a very high and unnecessary connection fee.

Studland Snippets

Studland Parish Council - The village is very quiet with no ferry and the closure of the road to Corfe Castle. The Parish Council has issued a press release expressing concerns about the impact of these events on elderly residents and local businesses. The latest on the ferry is that as it was being towed to Falmouth the prow was damaged. This may delay the return of the ferry until well after mid December. These events show how dependent geographically isolated communities are affected by closures.

The big beach café will be closing in early January 2023. Discussions are planned for a celebratory event to thank the café manager for more than thirty years of service to the community and visitors to the area.

It will be interesting to see if the coastal fencing at Shell Bay has any impact on the birdlife in Poole Harbour. The fencing measures are designed to protect winter visiting birds on the seashore inside the harbour from walkers and in particular, chasing dogs.

The Parish Council is continuing to manage road edges and leaf removal. These are duties for Dorset Council, 13th yet they seem unable to carry them out. The general view is that the proclaimed potential gains from the creation of the unitary Dorset Council have yet to occur.

The Purbeck Society (PS) - The December meeting will be on **13**th **December at 14.30pm**. Details of the location have been changed from Newton Manor. Please watch out for further details on the Purbeck Society website and Facebook page. The **January AGM will be held on Friday 13**th **at the Mowlem Institute.** Further details will be available via the Newsletter that will be e-mailed before the Christmas holiday. At the AGM, there will be a short talk on the countryside charity, the Campaign to Protect Rural England. Also information relating to the exceptional Dorset will be shared; those attending will hear something about Dorset that has never been shared before.!*Please make an effort to attend this meeting*.

The PS will be responding to the Swanage Town Council draft Corporate Plan 2022 to 2025. This draft contains questions relating to heritage, sustainable tourism and plans for the area. Swanage and its associated communities need volunteers, vigilance and vitality to ensure that the area remains attractive for residents and visitors.

The PS will be making the case for a new conservation are in Swanage in the New Year. Questions: Firstly, why are the sea surfers not at work? Should there be a heritage week in the area?

The Countryside Charity, the Campaign to Protect Rural England has claimed a success with its campaign to ban fracking in England. In late November there will be a further meeting in Parliament about hedges. CPRE has probably done more about promoting hedges than any other environmental charity in England.

It is thought that the Investment Zones will be dropped by the government given the mixed reception to this initiative.

Civic Voice, the national organisation for civic societies has expressed concern that the reduction of local authority conservation officers puts more than 400 conservation areas under threat. Let's hope that Dorset Council maintains its complement of conservation officers.

The Dorset CPRE website contains details of various webinars for members along with the latest edition of the Dorset Review. It is a good read.

Living in rural Dorset has a high cost in terms of transport, housing and jobs. In 2023 we will know more about the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill and the Environment Act. The latter is likely to contain details on Biodiversity Net Gain. Most developments will require the demonstration of at least a 10% net gain via the planning process.

Finally, both the Purbeck Society and the Dorset branch .of the CPRE will be increasingly asking in 2023 "who really cares about the Dorset countryside and its landscapes in times of climate change, biodiversity loss, war, and inflation?". To find out more please consider attending the Studland Parish Council meetings and even joining the meetings in Swanage and perhaps joining both organisations.

The Swanage Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group has now been set up and there will be plenty of discussions and opportunities for you to contribute to the content of the draft plan. A Neighbourhood Plan sets out the policies that are used to help make decisions about planning applications in the area; it is led by the local community and gives everyone an opportunity to have a say and help shape future development in the town. Throughout the process there will be both informal and formal community engagement, to seek the views of local residents and businesses alike.

This plan will go to Dorset Council to be considered as part of the legal planning framework of the county, and there will be a Swanage referendum prior to its adoption. Anyone who would like to be involved in the research and preparation of the draft plan should contact the Town Council on <u>admin@swanage.gov.uk</u> to offer their time and to find out more.

Some slight changes have been made to the Town Council's committees to help structure all the planning and work that will be taking place over the next few months. All at the Town Council are in for a busy winter!

This is not going to be an easy winter for anyone, but with the strong community support in our Town we are lucky to be able to offer help and assistance to those who may need it. In this newsletter there is information on groups who are able to lend a hand, so please ask if you are in need. But there is plenty of fun to be had too with the Christmas celebrations that will have taken place and hopefully some other events to look forward to in the new year.

Shop wisely this sale season and avoid getting less than you bargained for with top tips from Citizens Advice

With Christmas fast approaching, followed by the New Year sales, Citizens Advice offer the following top tips about how to shop safely online and avoid scams.

- Do your research: Before buying from a site you haven't used before, spend a few minutes checking it out. See what people have said about the person or company you're buying from by looking at reviews on different websites - don't rely on reviews the company has put on its own website. If you're worried that something you've seen online might be a scam, you can get help from the <u>Citizens Advice consumer</u> <u>helpline</u>
- 2. Be wise to scams in disguise: If a bargain seems too good to be true, it probably is. If it's branded but a lot cheaper than it appears on the brand's website, it could be fake. It could be a legitimate 'look-a-like' product. Either way, it might not be the quality you were hoping for
- 3. Ways to pay: Beware of a seller who asks you to pay by direct bank transfer. Bank transfers have limited protection if things go wrong, so avoid using them. You should only send and receive money through the online marketplace app or website using a debit or credit card, or via trusted methods of payment such as PayPal
- 4. Know your rights: If you've bought from a retailer you might be entitled to a replacement product or a repair of your faulty goods. You can even claim a full refund if you can prove the goods are faulty. If you've bought from an individual, perhaps via an online marketplace, you have far fewer rights. In fact, you have no right to return, so long as the goods are 'as described'. Always be sure to take a screenshot of the description, and be sure to check and double check before you buy
- 5. When things go wrong: Sometimes things just don't go to plan. If you've bought something that is broken, damaged, unsafe or not what you expected then contact the seller and give them a chance to put it right. If that doesn't work reach out to the <u>Citizens</u> Advice consumer helpline

If you're concerned about a scam contact your local Citizens Advice office on 0800 144 8848, or call into one of the drop-in sessions. Advice is free and no appointment is necessary.

Citizens Advice Raise Funds for Crisis Support Bus

Citizens Advice in East Dorset & Purbeck are raising funds for a Crisis Support Bus which will provide vulnerable Dorset residents with access to free advice and support.

The cost of living crisis has meant that many more people are in need of advice with some unable to access current services due to rural isolation, restricted mobility, cost of fuel or limited access to public transport. The mobile advice unit will deliver a service to rural areas and for those who cannot easily access outreaches, local libraries or are digitally excluded.

Katrina Ford, Business Development Manager, Citizens Advice in East Dorset & Purbeck, said: *"We have seen a big increase in the number of people turning to us for advice and they are struggling to afford heating and pay bills. We are most worried about those on the lowest incomes including the elderly, vulnerable and disadvantaged. Many of whom have the additional barrier of being rurally and socially isolated.*

"The Crisis Support Bus will be an easy to access, one stop shop for these residents, whilst ensuring accessibility to a diverse range of people, including those at a greater risk of disadvantage, detriment or harm."

Citizens Advice in East Dorset & Purbeck is an independent charity and relies upon grants and donations to fund their service and are looking for donations to help fund the Crisis Support Bus.

Katrina adds: "We are hoping to have the bus in the local community early 2023. To help achieve this, we are looking for support from local businesses and individuals to help fund the on-going running costs of the bus. 
Christmas on Swanage Pier

This year we are in full festive swing. We have live music, Christmas donkeys, Christmas characters and a chance to visit the big man himself, there is something for everyone!



Purbeck Mineral and Mining Museum



As local residents, how many of you are aware of the **Purbeck Mining Museum** and that it is part of the Swanage Railway Trust? Purbeck Mining Museum, adjacent to Norden Station, aims to preserves the heritage of the clay industry that once dominated this part of Purbeck. For decades Purbeck supplied the world's pottery industry, including Wedgwood, with the rare ball clay it needed. Clay mining narrow gauge tramways and railways were once commonplace across the heathland, and now form an integral part of the museum displays.

In addition, a further objective of the museum is preservation and development of the environment and wildlife within the 25 acres of former industrial land in which the museum is located. This area of Purbeck was once a barren landscape devoid of trees and wildlife as a result of this industry but is now a prime example of a rewilding success.

As a largely open-air museum, we're closed over the winter, but we have a number of projects in progress, in particular in looking after our woodland, for which we need willing volunteers. 

'Save Our Ambulance Car' -Review of 2022



The year started badly. The Ambulance Car service had been under threat of withdrawal for two years, and new freedom of Information Act responses showed that, despite the Ambulance Trust attending less emergency call outs to Swanage and Purbeck, emergency response times had doubled, putting hundreds of lives at risk, and that our Ambulance Car was staffed less than half the time, making it the Cinderella of the Ambulance Trust's Dorset fleet.

In February, the Town Council met the Ambulance Trust and the Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group. The campaign questioned some decisions made by Dorset Council, that did not support the retention of the Car, saying they would be seeking a barrister's opinion.

Then on 10th March a miracle happened - the very welcome news that the Ambulance Car was saved, and that the Car staffing would be addressed.

A Freedom of Information Act response to the Town Council for the period January-June 2022 looked at staffing, the number of Swanage and Purbeck emergency call outs attended, and our emergency response times. This was at best a mixed bag. Although the Car staffing had got worse in April/May, by June more than half the shifts on the Car were covered. 288 emergency call outs had been attended in Swanage and Purbeck, however, when the car was fully staffed, more than three times as many local call outs were attended in 6 months. Just over 60% of the Car's activity was in Swanage and Purbeck. Emergency response targets had been substantially missed. The category 1 response time improved to 12 minutes in June, however this is still well over the 7 minute target time that predicts survival for these critically ill patients.

The Town Council were told the Car would be fully staffed by September, and so we hope and expect the data for July - December 2022 to be much better.

In October the winners of the Swanage Community Awards were announced, it was great to see our Ambulance Car team acknowledged. Our particular thanks go to Martin Prouten and Russell Fox for keeping our Car going.

Good news! Support to protect residents access to NHS services

At Dorset Association of Parish and Town Councils Annual General Meeting on 19 November, a Swanage Town/ Corfe Parish Council motion passed with 87% support: for the Association to ask Dorset Council to use its statutory authority to challenge changes to health services that reduce residents access to health care, including in emergency, and require the new Integrated Care Board to produce a plan as to how it intends to deliver the improved access to health care promised as part of the Clinical Services Review.
