A Celebration of Purbeck

A film starring Purbeck's children has gone "on tour" after a host of schools clamoured to see it.

The film, "**Let's Go Wild**," was premiered at the recent Planet Purbeck Festival in front of a sell-out audience of 350 at Swanage's Mowlem Theatre. It was made by BBC and Netflix filmmaker, Sue Western.

Along with a talk by Springwatch TV presenter Nadeem Perera, the film was the centrepiece of the festival's main event, called 'A Celebration of Purbeck.'

Dates were arranged with all eight primary schools in the area such as Wareham St Mary and Swanage's St Mark's, and further showings are anticipated at the Purbeck and Swanage schools for older children.

"I've found myself sitting in school halls with tea and cake alongside parents, staff and children of all ages who are seeing themselves, their siblings and friends on a big screen. The children's expressions when they recognise themselves or places they know are priceless."

The celebration event capped a record-breaking festival – Planet Purbeck's third – which was attended over ten days by more than 3,400 people. More than 50 events were hosted by 90 local businesses, organisations or community groups, with funding support from the Talbot Village Trust.

A survey conducted by Planet Purbeck volunteers in the aftermath found that nearly 80 per cent of those who attended agreed with the statement: "I learned something new about protecting our local environment." More than half said they now felt more connected to the area's nature and wildlife, and nearly 60 per cent said they felt inspired to take action.

Festival organiser Luke M Luke said he was thrilled by the reaction.

"Our festival clearly helps to ignite the magic and wonder of nature, creating enduring experiences and the chance to discover something new."

Buoyed by the success, Luke said Planet Purbeck's next mission is to join a project in which a host of local organisations are planning events and experiences aimed at encouraging children and young people to enjoy and get involved with nature.



Langton Matravers Local History and Preservation Society

A Talk by Tom Cousins: The Mortar Wreck

Found in Poole Bay in 2020 by local diver Trevor Small this is the oldest protected wreck in English waters. It's timbers date from between 1242 and 1265, during the reign of Henry III. The many artefacts found at the site include Purbeck marble mortars (for grinding grain), copper cauldrons and two marble gravestones, both in pristine condition. The marble is from Purbeck and most likely to have been quarried near Langton.

(Tom is the Diving and Maritime Archaeology Officer at Bournemouth University. Projects include investigations into the Duplex drive tanks in Studland Bay, the Swash Channel wreck and prevention of timber damage by marine organisms)

As the year turns, the last few months have been exceptional for wildlife at Durlston in many ways. Take a walk around the Park and you can't miss the dense crop of crimson Hawthorn berries, which have been particularly plentiful this year and provide a fantastic winter food source for visiting Fieldfares and Redwings. It's easy to forget that not all migration is southwards – these attractive Thrushes travel south from Scandinavia to enjoy our 'balmy' winter climate! Walk around Swanage at night in December and you may well hear the goblin-like cackle of Fieldfares above you.





The late autumn also saw incredible numbers of Red Admirals – for a few weeks, almost every patch of flowering Ivy was covered with these striking red, white and black butterflies, with numbers nationally 400% up on the previous year.

We also recorded the highest ever numbers of Early Spider Orchids – more than 50% of the UK population of this strange and beautiful plant occurs along the South Purbeck coast and over the last 40 years grazing and scrub clearance have allowed them to thrive, with volunteers recording over 10,000 at Durlston alone!

Nationally though, the picture is very different, with many species of bird, flower and butterfly in chronic decline, making wildlife strongholds like Purbeck more important than ever.

Upcoming Exhibitions

There is plenty to enjoy in Durlston's Fine Foundation Gallery this winter! Our current exhibition – Rewilding Unwrapped asks the question "What if you just leave it?" and how rewilding can be a powerful tool to help us restore degraded landscapes. Photographer Sam Rose has captured stunning images of some of the species and landscapes being brought back from the brink as well as the people who are making it happen – the exhibition runs until the 10 December.

From the 20 December to the 14 January, "New Heights" explores the work of 'Allsort'd'. Based at Durlston's Learning Centre, they provide support for local people with disabilities to train, work, volunteer and socialise. Their exhibition will share the stories of some of their projects, including a sign-language choir, creative work and more.

Following this year's cleaning of the Great Globe, reopening and restoration of the Tilly Whim steps and the completion of the Pleasure Grounds Project, from the 17th January 'Victorian Durlston' tells the story of George Burt and his grand plans for Swanage and Durlston.

Could you offer a home to Ukrainian refugees in Dorset?

So far, more than 400 households in Dorset have sponsored refugees as part of the Homes for Ukraine scheme, but we still need more.

As the war sadly continues, more Ukrainians need a place of safety, and we are seeking new hosts in Dorset to help more victims escape the war-torn country, as well as Ukrainians already in the area who need to move on from their initial sponsorship arrangement.

If you think you could help by offering a spare

May God bless you?" room in your home or in an annexe or independent accommodation, we would love to hear from you.

In return, you will have a network of support and we will pay you £350 a month to provide a home for the refugees fleeing the war in Ukraine.

After six months the host payments increase to £600 per month as an extra thank you for continuing to host.

"They were so happy to be out of Ukraine and Iving in a safe/secure place. Yun, Pysa's husband, is still in Ukraine.

"The antangament was always that we were happy to host for up to a year so they have now gone to live in italy.

"Doniel Council ware very supportive during their stay and the Thank you' payments were very welcome to help pay for the additional bills.

We are so pleased we have managed to help is a small way in this terrible origin."

PURBECK CONNECT UKRAINE (PCU) – A PLEA FOR HELP and MORE FUNDS

In March 2022, following the Russian invasion of Ukraine, PCU was formed as a voluntary organisation to help Ukrainian refugees settle in the local area, as part of the charity Swanage Action for Refugees. There are now about 30 Ukrainian families in the wider Purbeck area, from Lulworth to Studland, who have been welcomed by local Host families.

In the past year, PCU's work has included:

- Linking up Ukrainian refugees with hosts in Purbeck
- Assisting with applications for visas, benefits, school applications
- Referring guests to services, e.g. the Foodbank, Job Centre and CAB
- Establishing links with other Ukrainian refugee groups in Dorset
- Providing essential information to our Ukrainian guests
- Supplying clothing, bicycles, phones, laptops, bedding and household goods
- Providing transport to essential appointments and medical visits
- Arranging social activities & events
- Enabling our Ukrainian friends to prepare a Ukrainian dinner for their hosts and volunteers
- Assisting with relocation to new accommodation at the end of the hosting period
- Providing regular English lessons for adults, and a Saturday school for Ukrainian children



This autumn, as the war continues, we are <u>still in need of more host families</u> to help more Ukrainians moving to Purbeck. Many manage to work once settled, but they have lost so much and are still in great need. We have seen some lovely friendships develop and there is such gratitude from those who have received help from PCU.

Also we <u>urgently require more funds</u> to meet the ongoing needs and to be able to offer essential support as necessary.

Please consider whether you could help in some way; perhaps you could hold a Coffee Morning or organise a raffle, hold a concert, sports or social event, or may be simply make a personal donation. If you belong to a group, perhaps you could ask if they also could give a donation to PCU to ensure this vital work can continue, for as long as it takes.

We also took part in the official opening of the "Flooding Swanage with Art" trail displaying the local artists who have decorated the previously unattractive concrete flood defence blocks. Please have a walk along the front from the Mowlem to the pier to enjoy the colourful paintings. And beware of the crocodile!

I was allocated a Mayor's Air Cadet, Isobel Mellor, who has the dubious honour. Was very proud to march in the November Remembrance Day Parade.



I have been given some free tickets for the Polar Express at the Swanage Railway for The Mayors Charites, the RNLI and Lewis Manning Hospice care, for whom I hope to raise some funds.

Meetings this past month have included discussions on the traffic problems around the town from speeding to poor parking and we now have forms available for the public to complete to report any issues to the Dorset Council who are the highways authority and have responsibility for the road safety. Volunteers take mining to new heights!

With visitor numbers up by 150% and donations up by a staggering 250%, it has been quite a year for the Purbeck Mining Museum at Norden. According to the museum's Chairman, Peter Sills, such success is a credit to the growing number of volunteers who commit so much time and energy to keep Purbeck's clay heritage very much alive. He said:

"All of the hard work is paying off and has enabled us to increase our opening times and the frequency of engine and wagon demonstrations throughout 2023. As well as volunteer training and familiarisation days we've also hosted more group visits and community events than ever before. Visitor feedback has been really positive but there is still much to do. Many of our exciting plans for further development of the museum and facilities around the surrounding woodland will come to fruition next year when we will also be organising a number of special events to mark our tenth anniversary. We are really looking forward to building on this year's success when we reopen next Easter."

The museum's volunteers will continue to work throughout the winter - protecting and storing the Museum's displays, developing the Museum's records database, cleaning track beds, maintaining buildings, servicing engines and rolling stock and preparing for the installation of a new welfare cabin.

Work is also continuing with construction of paths and viewpoints in the 25 acres of previously inaccessible woodland around the museum. This is aligned with the museum's broader diversification plans and collaborative initiatives to extend the appeal of Norden and Purbeck Park as an attractive destination for a wide range of visitors. In the words of Dorset Council:

"This project will provide people and their dogs with a fantastic walk, and breath-taking views of Corfe Castle. It will provide an opportunity to learn about the natural environment and historic mining operations in the area through the fantastic work of the onsite museum. The site also acts as a gateway to longer walks along the Corfe Ridges or a trip on the steam train to explore Swanage."



News from Corfe Castle Parish Council

20mph: Have your say. It is important that no matter your views, you register your opinion with the Parish Council. Dorset Council criteria states community engagement and show of desire for or against a 20mph scheme, must be proven for any application to be considered. You will find a survey and how to respond in the current issue of the CVN.

Become a Parish Councillor. It can be very rewarding being a councillor – having the chance to make a real contribution to your community. You do not have to hold certain qualifications to be experienced in a specific role, you just need to be passionate about representing the community you live or work in. National Trust: In October Corfe Castle Parish Council welcomed back James Gould, plus were joined by Mark Singleton the Countryside Manager (Purbeck) for the National Trust. Mark gave a verbal update on Swift boxes within the Castle, the Common's Committee & entanglement of deer within the new fencing on the Purbeck Heaths National Nature Reserve. Full details can be found in the draft November minutes published early December on the Corfe Castle Parish Council website.

Dorset Council: Corfe Castle Parish Council received an email regarding Purbeck Park footpath to Corfe Castle stating: "*We* will shortly be engaging our consultants to carry out an options appraisal to make sure that we have considered all other viable options so we can be certain of the best route to be taken forward." With this in mind Corfe Castle Parish Council will write and formally ask two Parish Councillors to be invited to meet with the Consultants to offer local knowledge of the area.

Corfe Castle Parish Council received an email regarding car park full signage stating: "In principle, electronic signs for parking sound sensible, but we couldn't sign people to the Park & Ride until there's an accessible walking route established between the Purbeck Park and the village. The messages and sign would also have to meet highway regulations, the location on the highway will need to be agreed, as will the predetermined messages on the sign. The Traffic Signals team will work with you on this." With this in mind Corfe Castle Parish Council will contact Cllr Brooks & a representative of the Traffic Signal Team to start engagement regarding electronic signage.

Greengage Community Garden









We are part of Sustainable Swanage and look to do our part in helping reduce the amount of food waste that would otherwise end up in landfill.

The pantry is open to all and runs regularly on Mondays (10 to 12) and Wednesdays (9 to 9:30) at Herston Village Hall. We also have irregular pop-ups where we have collected food outside these days.

The majority of food we distribute is perfectly fit to eat but has passed its best-before date, and great care is taken that we only distribute safe food, so nothing past use-by dates is distributed.

We collect donations from shops in Swanage and other groups such as Greengage where they have collected surplus produce from the allotments. The local Co-op and their staff are great supporters of what we do, as no one wants to see good food go to waste. Especially as this helps them reduce the amount of food that ends up in their dumpsters!

We partner closely with the other food distribution groups; Foodbank and Fareshare in Swanage, and occasionally distribute through the local primary schools.

The pantry was first opened in March 2022 and to date we have managed to redistribute over 5 tonne of food that would have gone to landfill. News of the pantry has spread and there are now queues waiting for us to open. As I have said, it is open to anyone that can make use of this surplus food, and if they can make a small donation for running costs that's great and if they can't that's fine as well.

There is very little food that the pantry has to throw away as we have volunteers that can use it for jams etc (who knew banana chutney was a thing!) or it goes to pets, or as a final resort compost.

We are a small group and are looking for anyone who can help either as regular or back-up drivers for collections.

Weston Farm goes Wild!

Aftermath of the 'perfect storm'

As many of you will know, the strong winds of Storm Ciaran, combined with unusually high tides, caused significant damage at Studland Bay. We're estimating that, over two tides, it created the amount of coastal erosion that we would normally expect to occur over



four to five years. The impact shocked our staff, as well as local people who know the area well.

Two beach huts were lost to the sea, as well as fencing, access routes and other infrastructure. Several metres of sand dunes collapsed, making other beach huts vulnerable. Six huts were moved out of danger, and others now need to be made safe for the winter. We're contacting owners of the huts most at risk to discuss options.

We ran two guided walks in September at Weston Farm, Worth Matravers, as part of the Planet Purbeck Festival. Both were fully booked, with almost 60 people attending. Our ranger, Ben Cooke, led the groups from the farm, along Bonvils Road, then straight on up the valley to a spectacular coastal viewpoint. Previously closed to the public, we are currently working to make this route a permissive footpath. Ben outlined our plans to let nature recover on the farm, including avoiding the use of chemicals and introducing a variety of grazing animals to create a mosaic of grassland, scrub and wood pasture.

Shake, rattle and roll

As the next phase of nature recovery at Weston Farm, we have sown some of the fields with yellow rattle. Also, known as 'the meadow maker' or 'nature's lawnmower', yellow rattle is considered to be the most important plant for creating wildflower meadows.

A semi-parasitic plant, its roots draw water and nutrients from coarse grasses. This weakens the grass and allows wildflowers to grow through. The flowers then attract a diversity of butterflies and other insects.

Look out for the yellow rattle coming into flower next May. The work was funded by the Countryside Stewardship Scheme.

Fingers crossed for Purbeck nature funding bid

Nature Reserve and a continuous coastal stretch from Durlston Country Park to forty landowners, farmers and organisations have come together in a bid for Government funding to help nature across Purbeck. The consortium, led by the Dorset Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, is looking for Landscape Recovery funding for an area of over 8,000ha. This includes the Purbeck Heath's National Kimmeridge.

Landscape Recovery offers farmers and land managers the opportunity to work together across large areas for the benefit of nature. The Government will fund 25 projects across the country – the successful projects being announced in December.

David Brown of the National Trust, one of the partners in the bid, said:

"Purbeck really is leading the way in partnership working for nature – so much positive action is already taking place, and much more is being planned. This is no longer just something we do in nature reserves; by working hand in hand with farmers who manage in nature-friendly ways we can restore nature across the whole landscape and put it at the heart of a sustainable local economy. Over my career as an ecologist the wider backdrop for nature has become increasingly bleak - but here in Purbeck I feel genuinely optimistic for our future." **Swanage Skatepark Community Project** (SSCP) was founded by a group of volunteers in Spring 2023 to give our community a say in the evolution and improvement of Swanage Skatepark, raise funds for new equipment and build an inclusive and welcoming culture around the skatepark by hosting events that will inspire and attract more users.

Agreement has been reached that SSCP will form a separate charity and project under the umbrella of Swanage & Purbeck Development Trust. This follows decades of fundraising carried out by Lorna Haines who continues as chairperson of SSCP.

Over the summer, SSCP invited people to have their say about the future of Swanage Skatepark by carrying out a user consultation survey which closed with 170 responses. The results of the survey will be released in November 2023, a design brief has been shared with park builders in order to obtain quotes for fundraising goals and fundraising will begin in Jan 24.


