Purbeck Connect Ukraine

Purbeck Connect Ukraine is a newly-formed group of volunteers - a section of Swanage Action for Refugees. The aim of the group is to provide help and support for Ukrainian families coming to Purbeck to flee the war in Ukraine.

At the time of writing, with the first Ukrainians already arriving in the area, we envisage a variety of ways in which we might be able to be of assistance:

First by offering a warm welcome and reassuring our Ukrainian guests that they are not alone.

Then by providing information about the services available, arranging referrals to the Foodbank, providing other essential items, offering transport to necessary appointments, help with filling in forms, English lessons, bringing them into contact with other Ukrainians in the area, providing fun activities for the children, remembering them in our prayers...

The possibilities are vast, and we will no doubt encounter other needs along the way.

At the moment we are taking the first steps in this direction. By our next meeting, we hope to have a comprehensive list of volunteering opportunities, so that people can sign up for tasks that suit their skills and possibilities.

We are also seeking ways of connecting people who have enrolled in the government 'Homes for Ukraine' scheme with Ukrainians wishing to come to England.

Swanage Community Defibrillator Partnership Keep the heart of Swanage beating

Would you like to join us as volunteer guardians?

We are pleased to offer an update on the Swanage Community Defibrillator project which continues to be well supported by our local community enabling us to monitor and maintain the ever-increasing fleet of public access defibs which will soon total 36 devices across the local area.

Since our last report, defibs have been deployed on three occasions, making a total of over 100 deployments since the project started in 2015.

The continuing success of this project is due to a wonderful team of volunteer guardians who regularly maintain the cabinets and check the defibs. are operational, reporting to a central point which now links to the national database "The CIRCUIT"; accessed by local Ambulance Trusts in emergency situations.

The original steering group of Ian Brown, Dave Corben, Kyle Hickman and Maggie Hardy is delighted that Mary Buck has formally joined the small team . Mary will be leading the familiarisation sessions which we hope to reintroduce when Covid levels safely allow us to do so.

One of the main aims of SCDP remains sustainability of the project and to this end, we would welcome volunteers to join the team as guardians or possible steering group members.

Arty birds at Shell Bay

From April, eight arty birds will make their home around Shell Bay to raise awareness of an exciting project that's coming in the autumn. Young artists from local youth groups and schools have painted the giant birds to help explain what the project is about. Those involved are Swanage Secondary, Sandford Primary, Montacute School, Dorset Wellbeing, Purbeck Youth & Community Foundation, Stoborough Primary, St Mary's Swanage and Linwood School.

Wading birds travel long distances to rest and feed during the crucial winter months. Poole Harbour is a designated Special Protection Area and provides an important safe space for these wading birds. In the past, Shell Bay was home to a large gathering of 4,000-6,000 waders, including Dunlin, Sanderling, Oystercatcher, Ringed and Grey Plover, and Bar-tailed Godwit. Most of them spending time here between September and March. Now, Shell Bay attracts just a handful of birds.

If birds are repeatedly disturbed, they'll abandon favoured roosting sites and not return in following years. It's vital for birds to be able to feed and roost in quiet zones as they need to keep all their energy reserves as high as possible for their long migrations.



To help protect and restore this once productive and important roost site at Shell Bay, a partnership project between National Trust, Birds of Poole Harbour, Natural England and the Birds and Recreation Initiative are installing a trial 'Wader Protection Area' which will provide a safe section of Shell Beach away from people, dogs, and horses where waders can quietly roost during the winter. It will also provide an opportunity to see what species take advantage of these safe spaces and could potentially set a framework for similar installations at other busy sites in Poole Harbour.

"Be aware of birds and don't scare" - Quote from Year 3 at St Mary's Primary School, Swanage

We've mapped out the area, the orange shows the coastal footpath, and the yellow box shows where the wader fence will go. The coastal footpath will remain accessible, and you will be able to walk on both sides of the wader fence during most times of the year. It is only during a high Spring tide, that you may not be able to walk on the sea side of the fence.

It has been a real pleasure to work with the young artists of Purbeck and Dorset, they are an inspirational lot and their passion for these wading birds truly shows in their artwork. The schools and youth groups have been buzzing with energy and highlighted some interesting ideas for us. This is the landscape they will grow up in, and it is wonderful to have the youth involved in the restoration process.

At Swanage Food Bank we don't look for gratitude from our clients, but it's very heart-warming when a busy

Mum has taken time to message us with a special thank you for the difference the bags of food (and Easter treats) have made to her family. Or when a stressed client in temporary accommodation has rung us following a recent delivery and thanked us with tears for the best meal she has been able to make for a long time. It's a pleasure to share such thanks with all our faithful community which supplies so much of the food we can pass on to local people in food poverty.

Likewise, we would like to express the pleasure given to many of our families through the generous donation of 100 Easter eggs by a branch of Dorset Freemasons.

We continue to buy provisions to supplement food donations as there is such a heavy demand upon our stocks, and we now have direct deliveries from Morrison's even though we are not a domestic address. It was an experiment and has proved successful. Fresh food we still purchase from our local stores, and we have spent more not just because of an increase in quantities needed but because prices are considerably higher. But financial donations have made this possible and we are indebted to those who give regularly and Gift Aid to add extra value to their gifts.

We are still asked for specific food needs, and by the time this is read, new shortages may have arisen but currently our list includes: sugar, instant coffee, biscuits, savoury crackers and snacks, tinned tuna and other fish, and all tins of meat. But every gift is welcome and useful, provided it is within the 'Best by' date.

I hope that Covid sufferers amongst us make a rapid and full recovery, and that the rest of us keep safe and Covid-free in this wonderful month of May flowers and warmer weather.

Pier renovations went well despite stormy weather

We commenced work around 18th February to replace ten wooden piles, four of which were at the landward end of the wooden structure, the others being throughout the pier length and at the pierhead.


The actual wooden structure of the pier was completely closed to the public as the decking and beams had to be removed to allow access to the piles. The piling contractor was planned to be on site from 18th February to commence removal of the old piles and the driving in of the new ones. Unfortunately, due to tidal conditions and Easterly winds, there was a delay of around ten days in pile removal and replacement commencing.

Luckily, there was a window of some reasonable weather, and the actual piling replacement work was completed around Friday 25th March. This left us with the beams and decking to be replaced, handrails and general tidying of the site, and of course the Health & Safety Inspection before the pier could be re-opened in readiness for the new season.

We had planned to be ready to open on 1st April, but with the delays experienced in February, which had to be put back, with the revised opening date being Saturday 9th April.

Luckily, the 1859 Café & Bistro, Gift Shop and Interpretation Centre remained open whilst the repairs were being carried out, as they were outside the exclusion zone.

We still, have five piles that require replacing and at the time of writing, it is planned to carry out this work later in the year.

Young People Grant Alert! - South West Enterprise Fund Opens on 21st March 2022 Closes on 17th June 2022

Young people in Dorset age 18 - 30 can apply for a grant of **up to £2000** for support with business start-up costs. Applicants should either be planning to launch a brand new business or within the first two years of running a new business. The grant can be used for equipment, materials, stock or services needed for the business - not for salary or living costs.

Applicants need a referee to support their application - this could be a previous or current teacher, employer or support worker.

Applications received by April 30 will receive a decision in mid-May. Subsequent applications will receive a decision in early July.

A message from the Mayor of Swanage, Councillor Avril Harris

The Easter weekend saw Swanage busy with holidaymakers enjoying the fine weather.



An event causing visitors and locals alike to stop and spectate was the Dorset Town Crier championship for 2022, organised by our own Town Crier, Andrew Fleming. As host, he didn't take part but I had the enjoyable task as judge of "volume" - which there certainly was! Despite absences caused by Covid, there was a good field and the Crier from Wimborne was the winner.

In mid-April, accompanied by the Deputy Mayor, I visited Purbeck Coast Radio, which is 99% run by volunteers and broadcasts from its studio in Marine Villas. This included a brief surprise radio interview – *well, it was to me!* - and I returned on 20th April to take part in a halfhour interview and phone-in, interspersed with music. This was a 'first' for me. I hope that there will be further such programmes, perhaps involving councillors as well as the mayor.


A unique project in Swanage is that of erecting the memorial statue of an unsung local hero – Trevor Chadwick. He became a teacher at Forres School, which had been founded by his father and later run by other family members. Trevor was remembered at the school for his

kindness, for arranging bus trips for locals to attend sporting events, and for organising parties for disadvantaged children. He was well liked by Swanage's fishermen, was a volunteer member of the Lifeboat crew, and a drinking companion of Lifeboat coxwain Bob Brown at the Black Swan.

Having been asked to help bring two children from Prague to safety in Swanage, Trevor returned there, where he was instrumental in arranging the rescue of 669 Jewish children in 1939, both before and after it was occupied by Nazi forces. He negotiated with the occupying forces and the Gestapo, bending rules and putting himself at risk. Trevor made several trips to and from Prague, escorting the children on Kindertransport trains and also on a plane journey. These children were entrusted by their parents to Trevor and others to be brought to safety in Britain and otherwise would have almost certainly perished in the death camps. Most of the children never saw their families again...

The Trevor Chadwick Memorial Trust has commissioned a life-size statue which has been designed by local sculptor Moira Purver, with Trevor portrayed holding the baby he carried during the whole of one journey to Britain, with a small child standing at his side. Despite most of the funds for the erection of the statue having been so generously raised, to fulfil the plan to have it ready for unveiling late this summer, we still have a way to go to raise the final £18,000 needed. 



A Thank You message from the team

Everyone at the practice would like to offer their heartfelt thanks for the numerous kindnesses, understanding and patience you have shown as we have endeavoured to offer a high level of support to our patients despite the pandemic

It may not always be obvious, looking from the outside in, that having got to know many of you and your families over the years, the concern we all share for your lives and health is deep-seated, and every effort we put in to ensure high quality care at the practice is relentless. At the same time, we tirelessly advocate for better services in hospital and elsewhere for you—because if they don't work well then you suffer.

Moving forward at the Practice with COVID - All contact with GPs continues to be telephone triage first. Our nurse-led twice daily urgent phone triage service will permanently replace the old Sit & Wait. Please be 100% assured that the clinician you speak to will bring you in if clinically appropriate. The nurse led monitoring of chronic conditions remain a mixture of face to face (f2f) & telcons. Like all NHS providers, patients are still required to be Covid-free & wearing a mask is recommended unless you have a valid exemption card. As events unfold we'll keep you informed of any changes by regularly updating our website: www.swanagemedical.org

Coronavirus - What to do if you think you have symptoms

We strongly advise that you follow the current Government guidance; take a Lateral Flow test if you feel unwell and isolate until you are testing negative. Cases are rising again and hospitalisations, particularly in the elderly, have significantly increased. For full details view the Govt. website. If you don't have online access ring 119 for the latest guidance.

Spring Covid- 19 Booster - The vaccination Hub at Wareham Hospital will be offering boosters to those aged 75+ & aged 12+ who are immunosuppressed (transplants, chemotherapy, some rheumatoid drugs & high dose steroids etc). This will be 6 months from a patient's previous Covid vaccination. Those eligible will be contacted by the admin team at Wareham. Patients can also book themselves in via the National Booking System. If they don't contact you but you believe you're part of this group of patients, you should contact the hub on 01929 557559/ 557589. This phone line is manned Tues, Wed, Thurs mornings and also has an answer phone. Please DO NOT ring the surgery about this—it is all being handled by the Hub @ Wareham. Many Thanks.

Prescriptions—The Way Forward During the pandemic we are not providing a reception counter service to discuss prescription queries. All prescriptions are issued electronically and NOT on paper. This protocol from NHS Digital Services effects all GP surgeries & we must abide by it. If you haven't yet nominated a Pharmacy please do so.

All repeat requests & queries should only come to us via your pharmacy, your online account or in writing submitted to the surgery letter box. Please note we DO NOT take prescription requests for repeats/new meds over the phone.

Bringing in a specimen— A reminder

1. Don't bring one in unless you have spoken to a clinician first. We won't test unsolicited samples.

2. If you have authorisation, and it's a urine sample, you will need to fill out a form on arrival. If someone is bringing the sample in for you, please ensure you tell them what symptoms you've got as that information is required for the form. <u>Please note: Anyone bringing a sample to the surgery must wear a mask.</u>



Psyiotherapy Referrals—If you have a new, acute musculoskeletal problem, the reception team can now book you in directly to see a physio here at the practice.

Just how much of our Ambulance Car have we saved?

The good news

We were delighted when Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group, and the Ambulance Trust, announced in March that the Swanage-based 24/7 Purbeck Paramedic Car would not be withdrawn. It's also been confirmed that:

 the Car will continue to be staffed by a Paramedic or an Advanced Ambulance Technician, the staff grades qualified to treat at the scene



 when not attending an emergency, the Car will continue to support the local GP's - this helps to 'tether' the Car to Swanage and Purbeck, so that it is more likely to be here when we need it

The not so good news - the staffing of the Ambulance Car

While it's great to know that we're not going to lose the Ambulance Car altogether, serious concerns remain about the staffing levels. Can we really say that an Ambulance Car that is not staffed most of the time is 'saved'?

Statistics from the Ambulance Trust this January show that our Car was only staffed two-fifths of the time in 2021, probably because there were only 2 permanent staff allocated to the Car, when there should be 5. We were given an assurance in March that these very low staffing levels would be addressed. However, 6 weeks on, it's not clear what has been done, and no timeframe has been given to bring the Car staffing in line with the rest of the Dorset fleet.

How badly is the Car staffed, compared to the Dorset fleet?

A recent Freedom of Information Act response shows the Swanage-based Ambulance Car is the Cinderella of the Dorset fleet by some way. While it is perhaps understandable that double-crewed ambulances are generally better staffed than solo cars, even when our Car is simply compared to the other solo vehicles, it still comes out very badly. While our Ambulance Car was staffed on average just 42% of the time in 2021, the rest of the solo Cars were staffed close to 75% of the time. It is particularly concerning that the Car was such an outlier, given the distance Isle of Purbeck residents have to travel to access emergency hospital care, which will only be made worse if the planned closure of Poole A&E, Maternity and Children's departments goes ahead.

What can be done?

Swanage Town Council will follow up on their request for a clear timeframe within which the staffing of the Swanage-based Car will be brought in line with the rest of the Dorset fleet. The Town Council will also be following up on our request for a six monthly report detailing Car staffing levels, and the emergency response times for Swanage and Wareham. If needed, I'm sure the other Town and Parish Councils will support our request.

We've won a big battle, but the Car really needs to be properly staffed before we can honestly say that it has been saved.

Did you know...? The new Pier was officially opened 125 years ago on 29th March 1897

When George Burt started a steamer service between Swanage, Poole and Bournemouth in 1874, the 'old' Pier was being used for day-trippers as well as stone cargo, it soon became clear that the Pier was unable to cope with the ever increasing traffic and it was decided a new and longer Pier was needed.

The first pile of the new Pier was driven on 30th November 1895 and was officially opened on 29th March 1897. However, the first steamer, the P.S. Lord Elgin, landed people on May 1st 1896. The Pier was an immediate success. 10,000 visitors arrived by steamer in the first season.

To celebrate this anniversary, we will be raffling a limited addition plaque on the Pier and a fabulous original painting by the acclaimed local artist Rebecca Lardner. We are delighted that Rebecca has agreed to undertake this commission which she is currently working on. The piece will include the Pier as the main feature and elements of Swanage.

Swanage & Purbeck Rotary has provided £500 to the Greengage Community Garden Project towards the cost of removing some Leylandii trees on the west of the site. The project was provided with matched funding from Swanage Town Council. The trees were shutting out natural light and preventing a wide area from being suitable for cultivation. Being situated just off Prospect Crescent, before the allotments, there's now a wonderful view overlooking Swanage and an excellent spot to relax and take a breather from the world around us.

The Greengage Community Garden welcomes people living in Swanage and the surrounding area and is open for anyone who wishes to participate in the life of the community. It runs from 10am to 3pm most Fridays from now to

mid-December and anyone who wants to get involved is encouraged to just turn up.

Tasks will be allocated according to personal preference, with support offered as required. There is a wide sharing of skills and knowledge and right at the heart of what Greengage is really about is the development of friendship and community and enjoying our time together. You can just pop in for a chat or take a quiet moment in the garden for reflection and relaxation. Produce is shared between attendees or offered for donations. The garden doesn't use herbicides or pesticides and tries to be wildlife friendly, creating a balance between nature and tidiness. As the project develops it is hoped to expand the activities to include extra hours of opening, linking with other locally based groups, attending fetes and shows and developing an educational function.

Plans for the future include creating more links with local schools and groups and there's also a hope to produce fresh fruit and vegetables for the Swanage Food Bank. Further projects include, replacing old wire fencing, new signage and flag, installing a pond and subject to planning permission, provision of a new building with working areas, toilet and meeting place. As the project develops it is hoped to expand the activities to include extra hours of opening, linking with other locally based groups, attending fetes and shows and developing an educational function.

STUDLAND SNIPPETS

Studland Parish Council

The Council is in the process of developing a resilience plan for the community. The winter storms and disruption to the electricity supply has raised the issue of vulnerable residents and back up arrangements that can be supplied locally to ensure continuity of services. Some residents in Studland were without electricity for up to five days; other residents were unaware of the opportunity to register with their electricity supplier so that they would be granted some priority status. To date a resident has volunteered to be the resilience coordinator and discussions are taking place over the provision of emergency cooking facilities likely to be in Studland Village Hall . The Dorset Local Resilience Forum has useful information for other local councils.

Some progress is being made with efforts to link up the footpaths in the Parish. Discussions on this matter go back to the Studland Parish Plan of 2009. Try the new path from Nine Barrow Down to Currendon Farm to see how safer walking can be implemented. Further work on paths from the Obelisk to the Swanage road and the reinstatement of unused former tracks are possible developments. Thanks are extended to the National Trust, the local tenant farmer, a local volunteer and Dorset Council for starting this important work. Perhaps in the near future we shall see a bridleway from Studland to Corfe Castle and much safer routes towards Swanage.

Looking after the local environment and embedding understanding in the hearts and minds of young local people is an important activity of stewardship for the area. Next time you walk along the sea shore at Shell Bay you will come across eight bird effigies created as part of a project between The Birds of Poole Harbour, Natural England, some local schools and the National Trust. These structures are designed to inform walkers of the disturbance that may be caused by dogs off their leads chasing over-wintering wading birds. The number of such birds has been reduced by up to 50% in recent years. Whilst the intention of this project is admirable the visual format and location of the wading bird effigies is intrusive and inappropriate to this special natural location. These precious areas deserve a low human footprint and special attention. Surely those organisations with responsibilities for the environment and conservation should review this visual impact and develop more sensitive ways of engaging with young people.

The Purbeck Society

The April talk on 'Bumps in the Bay' was very well received. Given the interest in the research on the undulations of the dea bed adjacent to coast, it is likely that the Purbeck Society will ask other organisations if the designation of the World Heritage Site can be extended to include an area under the sea. For readers interested in contributing towards a review of heritage assets in their locality please contact Jessica Sutcliffe , the secretary of the Purbeck. Society. It is important that local knowledge is used for the records of heritage assets that are being compiled by Dorset Council. Please help the Purbeck Society if you can.

The Campaign to Protect Rural England

Hedges, both more and wider, have the ability to contribute to carbon



reduction as well as impacting on the rural landscape. There are at least three styles of hedges in Purbeck yet not many skilled hedge layers. Maybe some training and development from Kingston Maurward College ...?

The Dorset branch is looking for a volunteer to assist with its campaign for hedges. If you have or know of someone interested in this topic please contact the Dorset office at the end of the article.

Dorset CPRE have a countryside forum where ideas are discussed and contributions shared. At the March meeting Andrew MacRobb of Herefordshire CPRE outlined a citizen's science project on water quality in the river Wye. Volunteers mapped the quality of the water over time. Given the importance of the rivers in Dorset and the increasing pollution of Poole harbour, something similar here may be appropriate. Up to 70% of riverpollution comes from farming and the rest is from sewage. Vigilance is required, especially in Swanage where plans for more housebuilding will create challenges for Wessex Water.

Dorset CPRE is continuing to promote the case for the Dorset Local Plan to reflect the exceptional environmental, ecological and archaeological circumstances of the county. The area branch of Purbeck and Poole is interested in hearing from readers about exceptional circumstances.

Finally, a challenge. How about planting an apple tree in your garden or immediate area? Even a small tree in a tub can supply apples in a year's time and even enable a Dorset apple cake or apple and blackberry pie . Food for thought!.

Disappointing News for Friends of Wareham Hospital



With the unfolding situation in the Ukraine, the disappointing news we received on 21st February '22 seems almost insignificant as we still have much to be positive about but the news that the plans for the promised Purbeck Integrated Hub had been scrapped evoked some very strong emotions amongst committee members.

We have been working with local organisations since 2015 on Purbeck plans and were discouraged from campaigning against the closure of inpatient beds at Wareham Hospital in 2018 as it could affect the proposals for the Hub bringing together health and social care staff on one site in an exciting development opportunity. We had hoped this would complement the Integrated Care Agenda, improve recruitment opportunities and service improvements for our locality area which perceivably has seen an erosion of local services for several years. The decision does not just affect Wareham; this will affect the whole locality, including Swanage, as staff work across the Purbeck area. Sadly, we are aware that key staff, disheartened by this news have already resigned.

We are told that the consensus opinion of Dorset Healthcare NHS Trust, who manage community services is that integration can be achieved through digital means and that finances do not support a new building. Interestingly the Trust which manages Dorset County Hospital feel that an integrated hub is a good idea and are proposing one for Dorchester!

There is however some good news ... We have been informed that Wareham Hospital, not long ago considered to be "unfit for purpose" is to remain for at least another 10 years.

Our support of Wareham Hospital and Purbeck Community Services remains strong and will continue but we would urgently welcome new members to the Friends to help us strengthen our voice should this promise also be broken. We can be contacted through the Hospital, Streche Road, Wareham.

We salute and thank all Purbeck staff who continue to work hard for us all in the area.


