And a huge thank you to all our volunteers who worked tirelessly to manage the queues, pour the drinks, flip the burgers, serve the cream teas, sell the raffle and tombola tickets, display the books, bric-a-brac and jewellery, entertain the children, and refill the water bowls for the dogs. It's always a brilliant community effort and we hope everyone who came enjoyed our Helpers Party which we held recently to celebrate and say thank you properly.

It was a record-breaking year, and we are delighted to be presenting a cheque to our raffle charity for the year, **Will Does**, for £750. The bulk of the proceeds of the Fete come back to the Village Hall, to invest in many of the planned 'upgrades' to the Hall and field over the coming months. October is a big month for movies at the Hall, as we host not only our own monthly movie night – Phantom of the Open – but also 2 films on behalf of the Purbeck Film Festival.

The Phantom of the Open tells the heartwarming true story of Maurice Flitcroft (played by the brilliant Mark Rylance) - a dreamer and unrelenting optimist.

Maurice was a humble crane operator from Barrow-in-Furness shipyard worker and amateur golfer who took up the sport in middle-age. He practised on the beach and became known for cheekily entering the British Open golf championship in 1976 as a self-declared professional, thus circumventing the handicap requirement for amateurs. He found himself competing with the likes of Seve Ballesteros, but chaotically chalked up the worst score in the tournament's history, to the spluttering rage of the puce-faced, blazer-wearing gentlemen in charge. They tried to ban him but he kept on gatecrashing competitions with wacky disguises and fake names.

Purbeck Connect Ukraine





As a sub-group of Swanage Action for Refugees, Purbeck Connect Ukraine supports Ukrainian refugees who have fled to Purbeck.

Throughout the summer, a variety of activities and social events have been held for our Ukrainian guests in the Purbeck area. A trip to Lulworth Castle proved very popular. One of our guests wrote the next day:

'We had a wonderful day yesterday! We forgot about the problems that worry us at home, did not watch the news about our cities. We are very grateful to you for your help... We are very interested in learning about your culture.'

On Ukrainian Independence Day (24 August) some of the Ukrainian families enjoyed putting and tennis at Beach Gardens. On the August bank holiday Monday, a number attended the unveiling of the statue of Trevor Chadwick in Swanage. That same day, Purbeck Connect Ukraine had a stall at the Harmans Cross fete. At the beginning of September, we organised a trip to Corfe Castle and the model village. Regular English lessons are being provided at Emmanuel Baptist Church. We also continue to facilitate access to clothing and other support for those in need.

Ukrainian refugees are still arriving in Purbeck, although fewer than at the beginning of the war in Ukraine. Some families already here are having to seek alternative accommodation. Hosts who signed up for the Homes for Ukraine scheme committed to providing accommodation for at least six months. As the six months come to an end, some hosts are willing to extend this period but others, quite understandably, are not. This means there is still a need for new accommodation as the war persists. We would be pleased to hear from anyone willing to host Ukrainian refugees.

The next meeting for volunteers and anyone who would like to know more about the work of Purbeck Connect Ukraine will be at All Saints Church Hall, Ulwell, Swanage on Thursday 20 October 2022, at 7 pm.

Music by the Sea Concert in Prince Albert Gardens

It was a glorious sunny day on 4th September, when hundreds of people, of all ages, came along to pay tribute to Henry Searle and Will Paddy; two young lads who tragically died very young. It was a repeat of last year's magnificent Memorial Concert, organised by Vicki and Jonathan Searle, Henry's parents, with music from all the many bands and singers who took part last year - plus many others. A wonderful day was had by all the happy audience and the diverse musicians and singers too. Something for everyone.



Vicky Searle asked the Swanage & Purbeck Paramedic Car Campaign co-ordinator, Swanage Town Councillor, Debbie Monkhouse, if she would speak to the crowds from the stage, letting the community know the latest news - as Henry had often used the Paramedic Car, and it had brought much relief and comfort to him and his mum and dad too. So Debbie was delighted to oblige and here's what she said:

'The Swanage & Purbeck Ambulance Car-Where are we now?

'The Town Council heard on the 8th March, from the health authority, Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group, that the 24/7 emergency response Paramedic Car would not be withdrawn. This was a huge step forward, following a two year battle. However, as there had been a plan to withdraw the Car since early 2020, by this March there were only 2 staff on the Car, not the 5 needed to staff it 24/7, and we had seen the effect of this in the increase, way beyond safe targets, of the emergency response times for Swanage and Wareham, putting hundreds of lives at risk.

'As a community we need hard evidence that the Car is back to full staffing and the Car Paramedic is able to attend the number of Swanage and Purbeck call outs they did before the Car was under threat. To give some context - there were just under 1900 Ambulance Car call outs to Purbeck in 2019, 1000 of which were to BH19 – Swanage and villages. This is the level of Swanage and Purbeck call outs that we expect to see again.

'The Town Council has asked for 6 monthly reports to ensure that we have the data to monitor the situation. For the Car to be truly saved it needs to be:

- 1) properly staffed, with staff not pulled off at the last minute
- 2) attending a similar number of local call outs to the number attended in 2019
- 3) enabling target Isle of Purbeck emergency response times to be better met
- 4) properly supporting the Swanage, Corfe and Wareham GP's

'So still a way to go – but I don't want to take away from the fantastic news this March that the Car was not going to be withdrawn, after a two year campaign. I think what stopped the Car from being withdrawn was the number and persistence of our community voices raised to save the Car, and the money raised by last years "Music by the Sea" tribute concert may have helped tip the balance – so a big THANK YOU to everyone!

'On 1st March, the week before we heard the Car was safe, the campaign raised a freedom of information act request to Dorset Council. Dorset Council had made a number of decisions that did not support the retention of the Car, despite having a statutory duty to stand up for residents, particularly where changes to services would put lives at risk. The campaign asked on what basis these decisions had been made, making it clear that when we received the response we'd seek a Barrister's opinion on the legality of the decisions.

'The money from the Music by the Sea tribute concert in 2021 meant that we could afford to seek a Barrister's opinion. In

the event we have not yet needed to do this, as we heard on 10th March that the Car was saved - but it is very helpful to know that we have the funds to seek a Barrister's opinion - if needed.

'The campaign also used money from last year's event for a website facelift. The website is an essential campaigning tool. 6 year old Everly Collins, whose life could be at risk if the Car is withdrawn, has become the 'face' of our homepage.'

Latest News from Corfe Castle Parish Council

"All in Corfe Castle will receive the news of the death of Her Majesty with great sadness. She has been our head of State for all of our remembered lives, and we have shared all our key national events with her.

"She embodied all the qualities one would wish of a head of State. She had enormous integrity, diligence, selflessness and calmness and what changes she has presided over! In her reign the United Kingdom transitioned from the end of Empire to the creation of the Commonwealth, a multi-cultural association of democratic independent nations across the World, a change she championed. She was held in enormous respect by all countries across the World.

"She presided calmly over similar tremendous change and periods of internal conflict in our country but leaves a nation, which has embraced huge political and social change. She said:

"This year the Parish celebrated and commemorated the Queen's Platinum Jubilee with a series of events including an enormous turnout for the lighting of the Beacon, a measure of how much respect with which she was held."

Statement released by Corfe Castle Parish Council

Road Closure West Street - Please see below the notice from Dorset Council:

"PROPOSED WORKS IN YOUR AREA - West Street Corfe Castle. To enable us to carry out maintenance work, we plan to close West Street Corfe Castle on 1st November 2022. It will be closed daily between the hours of 09:00 and 16:00. During the closure periods there will be no on street parking available. Parking restrictions will be imposed to prevent waiting or parking on the roads stated above. Any vehicle waiting in contravention of any restriction imposed by this Notice may be removed under the provisions of the Removal and Disposal of Vehicles Regulations 1986. If a vehicle has been towed the owner will need to contact our towing contractors Bride Valley on 01305 889421.

"Vehicular and pedestrian access will be maintained for residents, however there may be a time where they are asked to wait depending on the current activity on site, there will be a Traffic Management Operative on site to aid traffic. "In the current financial climate, the highways service has had to focus its budget on targeting the most damaged sections of road and areas with safety issues. The area to be resurfaced is from The Square to Hollands Close."

Dog Fouling: Council have been made aware of a particular issue concerning dog fouling within the Parish. Dog fouling laws are in place because dog faeces are unsightly and unpleasant. They also represent a serious health hazard. *Toxocariasis* can cause serious illness, leading to blindness. It is caused by a parasite which lays its eggs in the soil. If they are ingested by someone, for example a small child, they may hatch into larvae causing toxocariasis. So, the child doesn't necessarily have to pick up dog faeces in order to become infected – they could just be playing where the soil still contains eggs.

We very much hope that this article will highlight the anti-social consequences of not clearing up after your dog. Dog owners need to be aware that the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 allows local authorities and communities to create bylaws relating to dog mess and issue dog control orders against individual owners for offences including allowing their dog to foul in a public space. Councils can issue fixed penalty orders and serious cases can result in prosecution. If you witness dog fouling the best place to log the incident is with the Dog Warden at Dorset Council via https://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/environmental-health/dog-warden-service.aspx

Reporting Non-urgent Crimes and Police Issues: There are sometimes occasions where anti-social behaviour, suspicious activity or minor crimes go unreported. In order for the police to establish the extent of the problem and act accordingly, it is important that these instances are reported every time with as much detail provided as possible. If the police can establish any kind of pattern then it can inform future patrols. P/HOU/2022/04838 – 91 East Street, Corfe Castle BH20 5EE. Working Group Recommendation: No objection, but check the removal of three trees is necessary.

Let's Celebrate! New Upgraded Tennis Facilities in Swanage



SWANAGE TENNIS CLUB members have just celebrated their latest achievement of upgrading the tennis courts at Beach Gardens in Swanage so that there are now three floodlit Astro-turf courts as well as the three tarmac ones. All courts are available for hire and are now some of the best public tennis facilities in Dorset.

The club welcomed the Swanage Mayor, Cllr. Tina Foster, to officially open the new upgraded court. Joining her were club President Judy Longman, Cllrs. Chris Moreton and Bill Trite together with past club Chairs Helen Knight, Sam Christmas and Sue Tindale, Mike Angel, and Tony Saunders together with present acting Chair, Deborah Miller.

Swanage Town Council agreed to include the project on their capital programme for the 2021/22 financial year and make a financial contribution towards the works of $\pounds 6,000$. This sum, together with the very generous grant of $\pounds 4,000$ from Dorset Council and donation of just over $\pounds 8,000$ from the Co-op ensured that the project could be completed.

The celebration was part of a weekend of competitive and entertaining tennis by club players who had reached the Club Championships Finals. Oscar Mann and Josh Titley displayed skilful tennis in the 14&Under competition. Equally entertaining was the Ladies Doubles Plate final between Susie Eatwell, Gillian Humphries, Liz Lovibond and Leonora Stephen. Jamie McDonald triumphed over club coach Paul Marchant to take the men's Singles title with Jo Kiddell and Jane Langstaff beating mum and daughter pairing Maisie and Becky Gate to take the Ladies Doubles title (all photographed below).

Deborah Miller thanked all for supporting the court upgrade project, especially as it "will ensure that the quality of tennis facilities continues to be improved and maintained to a very high standard, especially for our future generations".

SWANAGE MUSEUM & HERITAGE CENTRE

The Square, Swanage BH19 2LJ - www.swanagemuseum.org.uk

The Swanage History Centre, based on the Victoria Avenue Industrial Estate, is the research arm of Swanage Museum and Heritage Centre at The Square. It houses the collection of artefacts belonging to the museum that aren't on display at the Heritage Centre. It is also home to the archives relating to Swanage and the Isle of Purbeck, including a growing photographic collection and a family history section. A small group of volunteers have been slowly and painstakingly working over the last few years sorting, listing and cataloguing the artefacts and paperwork.

In April The History Centre acquired the adjacent two units and have been able to expand and put the new space to good use. We will now be able to hang a lot of the growing collection of works of art that have been donated or bought by the museum over the years.

A local family has donated one such important addition to the collection. This is a large oil painting by M. Wood (we have no information about him or her and if anyone can through any light on them we would like to hear from you) and is a copy of a postcard produced by the Hildesheimer Company in 1904 titled by them 'On the South Coast near Bournemouth'. The painting had been in a local family's collection for a number of years. The family's mother has recently passed away and they were trying to decide what to do with the painting, as it was a large one. It shows a view of Swanage Bay from Whitecliffe Farm with the harvest in full swing.

Their mother bought the painting around 1949 from an antique dealer in Parkstone who told her it had come from a house sale close to Swanage. She brought it home on the pram holding her elder son. At the time they were living in a tiny rented house, so the picture must have taken up a lot of space. It had hung on the wall of the various houses the family lived in over the years until it came back to Poole.

The family have agreed to loan it to the Museum during the lifetime of their father who is 102 and in a care home. They then say: When he has passed away we will donate the painting to The Swanage Museum with the proviso that it is exhibited with a memorial plaque to Mum and Dad and that a legal covenant is in place to ensure that it always stays with The Swanage Museum or, if said museum were ever to close, that it is transferred as a donation to another Dorset museum complete with memorial, and not sold privately for profit. It is a great addition to our collection and already has pride of place.

Swanage's Frank Roberts receives the BBC 'Make A Difference Award' for Environmental Volunteering

Chris Packham, of BBC radio and TV fame chose our own Frank Roberts for the Environmental Award, for collecting litter for six years across Purbeck at the 'Make a Difference Awards 2022' held at the Guildhall in Portsmouth on 20th September.

In Frank's own words:

Soon after Midsummer's Day, I received an email from the BBC in Southampton informing me that I had been nominated for the 'Make a Difference Awards' and would I be available on 20th September to attend the Guildhall in Portsmouth?

I was proud enough to have paid my respects to Queen Elizabeth at 0130hrs on Monday morning 19th September in Westminster Hall, so on the day after Queen Elizabeth was laid to rest, the chance to visit the Guildhall in Portsmouth was a most pleasant experience.

Once there, I quickly became aware that the hall was filled with very keen and passionate volunteers and we heard many stories of how people in the South help others. Then the Environmental Award came up and before I had grasped my breath, Chris Packman was on the screen saluting me for my litter picking efforts. I was

shocked, as all I deal in is rubbish! It's rare that I'm lost for words, but for those who saw my off-the-cuff BBC South Today interview behind one of the side doors, you may well have seen the state I was

in! Shocked and Stunned of Swanage!

Anyway, It was a wonderful experience and I have been delighted and moved at the sheer numbers of lovely supportive messages that have followed. Thank you all.

Many others have highlighted the breadth of volunteering which I undertake, so I am taking take a moment here to see if others would like to join in.

Litter Free Purbeck. A number of us lead small groups across Purbeck who litter-pick in our local community. There are two groups in Swanage, with the Beach Buddies undertaking sterling work all summer. I urgently need volunteers, and most importantly a deputy to assist me, so **our team can push on with litter-picking across our lovely parish**.

<u>Swanage Army Link - Dawn Patrols</u>. Picking up litter along main 'A' and 'B' class roads in Purbeck, where drivers pass at the national speed limit, is not for the faint hearted. Last spring we picked up litter along *34 miles of vergeside*, bagged it up, and handed it over to Dorset Council. I have completed the industry recognised safety course for such work, and I am proud that our small team is able to succeed where others have given up. Are you able to get up in the middle of the night, provide your own Personal Protective Equipment and join us?

Remembrance Sunday. Many of you know that I have led the arrangements for events on Remembrance Sunday in Swanage for well over a decade. For many years I also encouraged family members of those who have gone before us to represent their family members on our Swanage parade. Whilst the Royal British Legion forms a major part of this civic event , it is sponsored by Swanage Town Council, and we are looking for a few keen people who are willing to assist the road marshals this year - would you help ensure this year's parade is as safe as reasonably possible?

<u>Swanage Railway</u>. For almost 40 years I have encouraged soldiers to support the Railway, and in more recent years the town. In the early years this work supported the installation of a cable communications network, and since 1997 a small team known as 'Team Herston II', has looked after the station at Herston Halt. Indeed, as part of the unveiling of the Queen Elizabeth II Jubilee Pond on 22 July this year, we formally launched Herston *Community* Halt, an initiative to

Experienced advisers are available to provide support about a wide range of issues including, debt, energy advice, employment, benefits and housing. There is a range of support available particularly to low income households which many residents many not know about.

Advice is provided through multiple channels including telephone, email, video conferencing and face to face from our offices in Wareham and Wimborne and from outreach services including Swanage and Herston. Home visits are also offered to those more vulnerable people who are unable to access these services.



Swanage Community Defibrillator Partnership Keep the heart of Swanage beating

Time to Celebrate as Project approaches 8th Year!

At our SCDP Open Meeting on Wednesday 14th September, we were delighted that the Swanage Mayor, Cllr. Tina Foster and her Consort were able to join over 20 of us, to celebrate our successful community project, now approaching its 8th year!

The Mayor kindly thanked the whole SCDP team for supporting Swanage and the surrounding villages with 40 public access Defibrillators across the area. The meeting provided the opportunity to thank the committed team of Defib Guardians who regularly check the cabinets and defibs and to acknowledge with sincere thanks the many people who have generously supported the project by funding defibrillators and other life-saving equipment and by providing funding to maintain the SCDP fleet. Defibs have been deployed to 128 incidents - 33 times this year to date.

The challenge now for the steering group team is to SUSTAIN this important project . As members of the Swanage and Purbeck Development Trust it has been possible and necessary to insure SCDP equipment (a defib went missing from its locked cabinet for over 3 months before being anonymously returned) and we are grateful to the Carnival Committee for naming SCDP as a beneficiary this year and to the Coastwatch team at Peveril Point, who organised a Tea and cake event for SCDP - all proceeds will support our monitoring and

maintenance and help us to provide defib. familiarisation sessions to the community.

Studland Snippets

Studland Parish Council

Some of the intrusive A Boards have been removed now the main tourist season is closing. The parish council will be discussing whether to form a local speed watch group similar to Langton. The value of such a group rests in the potential for speeding road users to slow down, as well as to supply evidence to support the case for a 20mph speed limit on the Studland roads. There is ongoing concern about road safety at the top of Woodhouse hill coming into the village and at the cross roads opposite Studland Stores. If there is to be some form of road crossing near Studland Stores, mainly to address seasonal traffic and safer pedestrian road use, then it is perhaps pertinent to note that in Switzerland, pedestrian crossings are on raised road surfaces and without flashing lights. Apparently, this is widespread - and works. Something for Dorset Council and its members to consider?

The parish council has yet to consider whether and how to respond to the government consultation on holiday lets, Airbnb's and second homes. The last two sales of former council houses by the housing association has led to two more second homes. If villages like Studland are to remain sustainable, then such matters need to be addressed by the relevant authorities.

As the evenings draw in the cries of the foxes, the mating calls of the deer and the hooting of the owls increase. Some new residents fear such cries, whereas those who have long lived in rural areas, welcome the return of these seasonal activities and recognise that night time should be for the animals and various birds.



The Purbeck Society

The next meeting is on Friday 14th October in the community room of the Mowlem Institute at 14.30pm. The speaker is a local diver, who will share photographs and experiences of the underworld paradise associated with our coast. Please tell others about this event.

One of the activities of the Purbeck Society is to keep an eye on buildings, both old and new. Should the bandstand be registered as a listed building? It is the only one in Purbeck. Such unique structures may benefit from a degree of protection. Dorset Council are completing (via Edinburgh-based consultants) their review of heritage assets in the county. The survey of the non -listed heritage assets in Swanage has been submitted to Dorset Council. It is understood that the ten best examples of heritage assets will be recognised by Dorset Council. Even though the time for registering heritage assets with the consultants is coming to an end, there will be ongoing opportunities for registering heritage assets in the future. The town of Swanage and the surrounding parishes of Langton, Worth, Corfe Castle, Studland, Church Knowle and Arne may be interested in such registration. A comprehensive list of heritage assets for south Purbeck would seem to be a worthy goal.

Latest news from Friends of Wareham Hospital

As I write this update I am also considering my report to the Friends at our AGM to be held on 26th September.

The year has been an emotional roller coaster with 'up and downs' and uncertainty for Wareham Hospital / Purbeck community staff, and for us as a Friends Group with promises broken and hopes dashed.

Having been advised not to challenge the closure of inpatient beds at Wareham Hospital in 2018 as it could affect the promise of an Integrated Purbeck Community hub we were *so* disappointed, when having given full support to the Hub plans, the Trust scrapped them stating that the Coronavirus had identified different ways of working and the new hub was no longer necessary.

As a Friends Committee we wrote to the then Chief Executive requesting more information about this change – sadly we have yet to receive a reply! We believe this decision is very short -sighted as the Hub would also have provided a much improved working environment for community staff and hopefully supported retention and future recruitment of staff

However, we are now told that Wareham Hospital is to remain and the Trust has indicated that it will invest in the hospital building and support the development of local services in Purbeck. As Friends we will maintain our strong interest and support for the hospital whilst also supporting community services, enabled by our change of Constitution some years ago. We are hopeful that there will now be better utilisation of the hospital building by relocating community staff from the current work area in Bonnets Lane where staff have limited facilities. The site also offers opportunities for improved parking which we would support as a benefit to patients attending the hospital, staff and local residents.

It has been indicated that the Purbeck Vaccination Centre at Wareham Hospital will be in place for a further 3-5 years. The facility has proved to be a great asset to the locality and I feel privileged to still be part of the vaccination team. The organisation of such a successful service has been massive with frequent guidance changes often coming at short notice, but all credit to a very committed hardworking team led by Rafael Mata who working with local practices and very importantly a strong and dedicated team of volunteers, Purbeck has been provided with a local Covid vaccination service.

The Volunteers are the' unsung heroes' who work in all weathers inside and outside the centre and whose work the Friends wish to acknowledge with sincere gratitude and say a big "Thank you " to all.

Whilst we have faced disappointment we are heartened with new opportunities presented for closer working together across the area and are pleased to have welcomed the Chair of Swanage Hospital Friends to two of our recent meetings.

Unveiling of the Trevor Chadwick Memorial





A very special and poignant day took place on August Bank Holiday Monday, when a bronze statue to local unsung hero Trevor Chadwick was unveiled by his grandson Samuel, on the Children's Recreation Ground overlooking Swanage Bay.

Trevor was instrumental in saving the lives of 669 refugee children at the outbreak of the Second World War, arranging their removal from

Prague to the UK. Trevor's story had remained untold for some 80 years until local Councillor William Trite discovered some documents relating to Trevor's extraordinary exploits.

The ceremony took place in brilliant sunshine with around 300 guests and attendees present. The Lord Lieutenant

of Dorset, Mr Angus Campbell, the High Sheriff of Dorset, Ms Sibyl Fine King, Richard Drax MP, and Councillor Val Pothecary, Chairman of Dorset Council attended.

The Trevor Chadwick Trust's Chairman, John Corben, said:

"The statue is an outstanding tribute to a person who has become known as 'The Purbeck Schlindler'. It is situated in a prominent position at the children's playground (now renamed Trevor Chadwick Park) and overlooks Swanage Bay to the Lifeboat Station where Trevor served as a crew member for a number of years.

"This was the culmination of two and a half years of hard work from a team of dedicated people whose commitment and dedication has enabled the project to be successfully completed on time. Not forgetting, of course, the many incredibly generous financial donations that made it all possible - and our very own Sculptress, Moira Purver, who created this amazing life-size statue."

PIONEERS SHOW HOW WE CAN SAVE ENERGY IN THE HOME WITH LAUNCH OF THIS YEAR'S DORSET GREENER HOMES

A DORSET CLIMATE ACTION NETWORK EVENT

With fuel prices soaring, this promises to be a hard winter for people struggling to pay their bills. There is a wealth of advice on how to save energy in the home, from switching lightbulbs to LEDs to unplugging devices which draw electricity on standby.

But can a home be made more energy efficient? Where to start when insulating your house? Over two weekends at the beginning of October sixty homes across Dorset will be open to visitors to give practical help on how you can use less energy and resources.

Colin Tracy, one of the organisers of Dorset Greener Homes, says "Much of the available advice on insulating your home comes from people who are trying to sell you their own product. By visiting private homes where the owner has installed insulation or heat pumps, visitors can learn from their experience in an unbiased way."

The homes range from new-build EcoHomes with heat pumps and ventilation systems to simpler and cheaper approaches to making a home greener. This is the ninth year the Open Greener Homes event has taken place, but this year has a record number opening – 60, including several new ones. For the first time these include a *Passivhaus*, built to a scientifically developed standard to minimise heat loss; a self-build home with ground source heat pump; a church which has installed solar panels and a heat pump, a village hall and a youth club. In one of the homes the owner has installed internal insulation on the walls using natural materials such as sheep's wool to ensure that the home is not only warm but avoids problems of damp.

The homes are spread over all of Dorset and open at different times. Some require booking in advance. Sam Wilberforce, co-organiser says: "it would not be possible to visit more than a handful of these homes, and it will be worth visitors deciding what features they are interested in and picking those houses which have installed them. The more popular ones will be booked up quite early. As they are spread over a the whole of the county some planning is essential".

Friends of Swanage Hospital Committee were pleased to welcome Dawn Dawson, Acting CEO Dorset Healthcare University Foundation Trust, {DHUFT} to our meeting in September to establish how it's envisaged that Swanage Hospital will – post Covid – return to "business as usual".

Dawn explained that DHUFT is working to the Governments' latest initiative of "care closer to home" which should avoid unnecessary admissions to, and facilitate a speedier discharge from, the Acute Hospitals and sees Swanage Hospital - due to its unique geographical position - being ideally suited to deliver this initiative and become the centre for our local health and social care services.

We discussed at length the importance of having an "Open access" for our much-valued MIU and highlighted that often, when using the National 111 service our local community are not offered the option of an appointment at Swanage Hospital. We were assured that the issue with the 111 service would be speedily rectified and that anyone presenting at the MIU with an *urgent medical condition* suitable for treatment in an MIU would be seen and assessed.

I was pleased, at the invitation of Maggie Hardy, Chair of Wareham Hospital Friends, to be able to join the Wareham Hospital Friends meeting in August and establish that many of the queries and concerns raised were very similar to those of Swanage Hospital Friends; we are very excited to be working more closely together to achieve services "closer to home" for our respective and combined local communities.

So, in anticipation of returning to "business as usual" we hope to see many of you at our AGM, which is reverting to an afternoon meeting, on Wednesday 26th October 2022 at 2:30pm in the Emmanuel Baptist Church, BH19 1AZ

Another date for your diary, and not to be missed is our Autumn Fayre on Saturday 19th November 2022, Venue to be advised.

Finally, if you are visiting the Hospital and have the chance to visit the Garden, please do so as the Autumnal colours are superb.

Another summer nearly over... and it was different. It was hot and dry. But with less visitors than the previous two years in the Purbeck area. 1976 was used a lot as a reference point, and perhaps it's good to reflect that whilst there were plenty of fires this year, there were none quite as catastrophic as the one on Hartland Moor 46 years ago. It's been heartening to see so much support for a ban on disposable BBQs... here's hoping that their use in our landscapes continues to diminish.

There are a few other changes since 1976... in Purbeck heathland is more extensive than it was then. It means the habitat as a whole is more resilient, and will be even more so with the introduction of beavers and rewetting of some of our peat bogs. These sponges are not only greater sequesters of water and carbon, and important for many rare species – they also act as great fire breaks. The work of our fire brigades is so impressive, and the coordinated way we all manage the landscape to reduce the impact of any fire is down to many people's hard work.

We've been working in a number of different ways with the Swanage community. My colleague, Alex, has coordinated the wonderful community partnership to work out what support we can collectively provide to the current (and soon to be worse) cost of living crisis.

We're continuing our work with **The Swanage School** – and hosting most of the school for its annual Healthy Minds Day. Last year it was brilliant to see so many of the pupils thoroughly enjoying themselves in a place that not all of them go to as often as you may expect. We're working through the various reasons (and it isn't all about car parking) and coming up with long term solutions – the information the pupils are providing to us, is critical to this.

Finally (Alex again) is working with **St Marks School**, with some funding from *Nature Heals*, to see how we can help more pupils make better use (for their own health and wellbeing benefit) of the fantastic landscape of Purbeck. It's early days, but we're already thinking about how we can maintain a long term relationship with the school.

Writing this on the equinox, if definitely feels like autumn – I hope you enjoy the changing of the seasons as much as I do.

Innovative technology for car parking at Durlston

On arrival, your registration number will be recorded by the camera and upon leaving, you will need to put your registration number into one of the two new machines and pay for the time period of your visit.

The system will be able to automatically recognise 'Friends of Durlston' and the Volunteers' number plates, enabling the special rates be to applied. It will be operated by an outside company, which will reduce the burden on the Rangers. And should ensure everybody takes part!

This incredible upgrade should be up and running by December, but hopefully, sooner.
