Record number of visitors at Purbeck museum

With its extended opening hours for 2023, the Purbeck Mining Museum at Norden has seen a fourfold increase in both visitor numbers and donations so far this year.

"Such a tremendous achievement is a real credit to the growing number of volunteers who commit so much time and energy to keep Purbeck's ball clay heritage very much alive," says the Museum's Chairman Peter Sills. "We've also hosted various community events and VIP visits since opening our doors at Easter, and I'm delighted there have been so many organised group visits where the feedback has also been extremely positive and supportive."

The escorted group visits so far this year have included many different organisations and community groups, ranging from the 2CV Owners' Association to Cub Scouts and tour operators. Guided tours for larger groups are normally hosted on days when the museum is not open to the public and are a great way for visitors to have a more in-depth view of the museum and enjoy more detailed discussions about the exhibits. This was the case for a group of 34 visitors from

Jurassic Jaunts earlier in May who were also shown around areas not normally open to the public, such as the engine shed and wagon maintenance areas.

Smaller groups for escorted tours can also be hosted on the Museum's regular opening days, although it is also possible to have unescorted visits where the leader of a visiting group is provided with a detailed brief on arrival. Such group visits have recently included very successful visits from supported holiday specialist Jollydays Holidays as well as a group of Cub Scouts from Romsey.

In view of the special arrangements that have to be made, the Museum normally asks for a set donation per head for group visits. "We continue to receive many enquiries regarding group visits and are expecting to host many more groups in the coming months," continues Peter Sills. "And we are very confident that visitor numbers and donations will continue to climb over the summer – this promises to be a record year for the Museum!"



Ofsted report - St George's C of E Primary School, Langton Matravers

St George's School was listed by Ofsted in April. The Inspection Team found the school to be 'good' in all areas:

Overall effectiveness	Good
The quality of education	Good
Behaviour and attitudes	Good
Personal development	Good
Leadership and management	Good
Early years provision	Good

The inspectors explored what it is like for a pupil to attend the school. They commented:

Pupils are proud to be a member of St George's. The strong Christian values of love, truth, forgiveness and respect are brought to life in the school's work. Parents speak highly of the school, describing it as a school with 'an excellent ethos'.

Leaders have high ambition for all pupils, including pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND). They ensure everyone has the support they need. As a result, pupils are motivated to learn.

Pupils uphold the school values in all they do. They are calm, respectful and considerate of others. They know the school rules and behave well in lessons. Older pupils enjoy being role models for younger pupils at playtime. Pupils feel safe at school because staff help them if they have any concerns.

Focusing on leadership, the inspection team noted:

Leaders, staff and governors have worked together to make rapid improvement since the previous inspection. The school community is complimentary about the drive of the headteacher. Staff say that recent changes are well thought through and have a positive impact on their workload. Pupils and parents say that the school is a welcoming place to be.

Leaders and governors have a shared vision. Governors provide relevant and constructive challenge for leaders and engage proactively with external challenge and support. This has helped to improve the quality of education.

Leaders have selected the precise content they want pupils to know in most subjects. They have sequenced knowledge so it builds on to wider ideas about the subject. Pupils can recall their learning in depth. For example, in mathematics, pupils find review questions useful. They talk confidently about prior learning and explain how their fractions learning has developed over time. In Reception, children develop their understanding of numbers and can create number sentences independently.

Pupils know the importance of the school's values. They encourage each other to be responsible. As a result, the school is a calm place to be. Pupils know what is expected of them and they rise to these expectations. This begins in the early years. For example, leaders teach children routines, such as lining up, through song and rhyme. Pupils love initiatives such as 'secret student' during assembly to reward a child who has behaved well. Pupils have designed postcards that members of



the school community can send one another for positive behaviour and effort.

Leaders ensure the personal development curriculum has high importance as soon as children start in Reception. Children learn about right and wrong. Pupils create recipes to explain how to be mentally and physically healthy. Staff teach pupils the importance of quiet moments for reflection. Pupils know it is important to treat everyone with respect despite any differences. They benefit from trips and a wide array of clubs, such as choir, football and gymnastics. Pupils take pride in leadership roles, for example, as eco and school councillors.

This was a very encouraging and well deserved endorsement of the school. Ofsted recognised and praised the drive and leadership of headteacher, Katy Astle, and the hard work and support of all staff who work in the school.

Langton Matravers Local History and Preservation Society

The Society have been having a busy time in the last couple of months. We re-opened our Museum at the Coach House, Langton Matravers on April 1st.

Do please come and pay us a visit when you are next passing, or make a special plan to come! We are just behind the St George's church (BH19 3HZ).

Custodians will be very pleased to welcome you, and the museum is open 10-12 and 2-4 every day except Sunday. There is an exciting new display about the role of radar in winning the war,

and also, on loan from the Swanage Pier Trust, a rare relic, the brass name letters from the 'KYARRA', sunk off the Purbeck coast by a German U Boat in WW1. The Purbeck Stone museum exhibits now have some excellent interpretation boards and new lighting.

We held our Annual General Meeting on Thursday 18th May in Langton Village Hall, and this was well attended. We had a lively discussion regarding the Society and Museum and many interesting points and ideas were aired. We said goodbye to our outgoing Chairman/Treasurer/Membership Secretary, David Selman, thanking him for many years of splendid service. Daryle Pearson was elected Chair, and other key officers were appointed.

The museum is working towards Accreditation status. This will help us secure Grants and other funding open to small museums.

It was agreed at the AGM that we need to encourage people in the wider community to take an active role in exploring the history of the area, and make links with local schools and other organisations to help us to do this.

Membership fees, payable in September, are £10.00 for an individual, £15.00 for a couple. Please do consider joining us if you are not already a member. We are planning a couple of summer outings; guided walks in the area in August and early September, and a 'Show and Tell History Day' - watch our website for further details: www.langtonia.org



These nostalgic images, most of which date from the 1920s to the 1950s, promote a stylised and sun-drenched vision of the Great British Seaside when pleasure piers still played an important part in holiday infrastructure as landing stages for paddle steamers.

With the full exhibition featuring more than 50 poster images, visitors are invited to take a tour around the piers of England, Scotland and Wales as depicted by some of the best commercial artists of the twentieth century including Charles Pears, Tom Purvis and Frank Henry Mason. See how your favourite resorts once looked and enjoy the artistic licence that helped sell them to the masses of railway travellers in the past.

The exhibition is free to enter and is coming to Swanage Pier between the 1^{st} – 15^{th} July 2023, situated in Marine Villas.

Studland Parish Council - The Parish Council is considering installing exercise equipment for adult residents in the village playing field. Estimated costs are from £28,000 to £40,000. It is not known if a majority of residents support this level of local spending.

Concern has been raised about the removal of hedges at Holmdene on Manor Road in the bird nesting season.

A planning application for Whitehills on Swanage Road involves a glass linked walkway to a new garage. Such glass structures are more suited to Sandbanks. Sandbanksification is best restricted to Sandbanks.



It is understood that a revised planning application for the Haven Hotel is being considered. The Parish Council and the National Trust have previously objected to plans to raise the height of the hotel and to have a glass rooftop restaurant.

The Somerset Association of Local Councils has received from Somerset Council £1.5 million to deal with post unitary re-organisation. The Dorset equivalent organisation has received £28,000 per year since the creation of the Dorset Council.

The Purbeck Society - The visit to the Veterans Forge has been delayed until later in the year. There will be a Friday afternoon talk on the bollards in Purbeck. The bollards in Swanage are considered to be heritage assets. However it is not known if either Swanage Town Council or Dorset Council plan to list these heritage assets.

There appears to be no response to the Purbeck Society's earlier request for public engagement in the Swanage Neighbourhood Plan. The Purbeck Society consider it necessary for the public to have an opportunity to influence the formulation of the Swanage Local Plan now rather than just to note proposals.

Dorset Campaign to Protect Rural England - Representation is being made to Dorset Council and others for solar panels to be placed on rooftops including car parks and warehouses. Solar panels farms are not considered to be appropriate structures to be placed on agricultural land.

The Chickerell battery storage facility is considered to be a risk for local residents. Dorset CPRE supports the campaign against this facility.

There is concern over draft plans for an hotel and fast food eateries on the A35 road. This concern relates to road safety and water supplies to existing residential accommodation.

Dorset CPRE has not noticed any substantial changes to habits and behaviours despite support for action on climate change.

A country party will be held at Mapperton House in July.

News from Corfe Castle Parish Council

Annual Parish Meeting: Another year and another Annual Parish Meeting has taken place. Turnout this year was a little disappointing, but maybe we can take this as a positive sign and that you think the Parish Council is working as you would wish? However, the Parish Council see the Annual Parish Meeting as a way for you the residents, to talk Face to Face with your local Councillors, not only to voice what you think the Parish Council has done wrong or where it could make improvements, but to have your say on what area or facilities you would like to see the Parish Council develop next year. Next year's format will be very similar to previous years, in that there will be a couple of local groups / organisations giving a quick 5-minute talk, however next year you can sit and listen whilst enjoying a nice refreshment or two!

Correspondence with the Parish Council: There was once a time when the Parish Council had a notice on their website stating, if you contacted the Parish Council, you had to assume your correspondence and any personal details contained would be forwarded to relevant parties; I can hear the screams now! Times have changed and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) now states that your personal details must not be shared with anyone or stored unless you give specific permission to share or store your data. Personal Data is not just your name, email address, phone number etc, it can be anything within the correspondence which identifies you. For example "my neighbour Mr XYZ", when Mr XZY only has one neighbour; or "my dog Fido" when Fido is not a common dog name! Although the Parish Council firmly follow the GDPR rules, please rest assured when you send correspondence to the Parish Council where permission is granted your message will be forwarded to the relevant people. Where permission has not been granted but is required to ensure the correspondence makes sense, permission will be sought. Finally the most common method practised is that where personal data can be redacted (blocked out) before forwarding, it will be removed.

Illegal Rave: The Parish Council is aware that the illegal rave held on 27th May 2023 caused upset to some residents for various reasons. In response to this the Parish Council contacted Dorset Police and asked someone attend the June meeting to explain what happened, and what measures are being put in place to stop this from happening again. Sergeant Simon Colvin from the Purbeck Neighbourhood Policing Team attended and explained the events as they unfolded and the Dorset Police procedures for dealing with such an event. Sgt Colvin has reassured us that although the illegal Rave has long since gone, the work behind the scene by the Criminal Investigations Department continues on the potentially criminal aspects. The Council will be writing to the Police and Crime Commissioner for Dorset, David Sidwick, asking for a strategy to prevent future occurrences.

Campaign: Corfe Castle Parish Council will shortly be writing to Dorset Council to request, that Dorset Council underwrite the cost of an accessible and chargeable minibus which would act as a shuttle between Purbeck Park, the National Trust Car Park and the Village Centre. This is because the Council believes the proposed cycle and new pedestrian access is still years away. There would then be a reasonable alternative to parking at West Street and it might reduce the number of cars entering Corfe Castle trying to find parking when visiting Corfe Castle.

Goat Path: Over the last few months the National Trust has been keeping the Parish Council up to date with the deterioration of the "Goat Path" which runs along the Mound. The National Trust appreciate this is a public footpath and is working with Dorset Council to ensure the path remains in place, and safe to use. Due to the location of the path, it is not a simple fix, so both the National Trust and Dorset Council are looking into ways this path can be made safe to continue to use, whilst not disturbing any archaeology which may lay beneath.

Application No: P/LBC/2023/02107 & P/HOU/2023/02104, **Location**:18 West Street, Kingston BH20 5LH. **Proposal**: Internal changes, with new iron downpipe on the exterior. **Recommend**: No objection, due to the drainpipe not being particularly visible **Application No**: P/ADV/2023/02753, **Location**: The Castle Inn BH20 5EE

Proposal: Replacement external signage and lighting, **Recommendation**: CCPC object as although the proposed signs seem sympathetic to the listed building and largely match what is already in place, the proposed change of colour from white to blue to the building is not sympathetic to the surrounding buildings or the street scene.

Application No: P/HOU/2023/01990, **Location**: 10 Halves Cottages, BH20 5EY, Proposal: Garage, Car Port & loft conversion. **Recommend** No objection. The project for the garage and car port fits neatly into the available space which is currently waste land or driveway. There are no overlooking windows from the neighbours. This could be considered overdevelopment however on site it looks OK. It will be the only house with third story dormer windows in the street; however, they are not obtrusive and do not overlook neighbours.

Application No: P/LBC/2023/03088; **Location**: Rempstone Hall; **Proposal**: Replacement windows. **Recommendation**: No objection. This application is to replace old, dilapidated metal windows with modern double glazed aluminium windows. It seems a very sensible solution which will improve the energy efficiency of Rempstone Hall.

Application No: P/TRC/2023/02878; Location: 108 West Street, BH20 5HE

Proposal: G1 Hazel and purple leaf hazel - Coppice., T1 Beech - Reduce height by 3-4 metres. Reduce side by 2-3 metres retaining a natural flowing branch line.

T2 Lime - Reduce lime to match the adjacent lime tree. T3 Cherry - Fell to ground level. Grind out resulting stump to a minimum of 200mm below ground level.

Recommendation: No objection as a replacement tree will be planted to replace the felled Cherry Tree.

When we enter 'new normal', perhaps some may have to give up this work as other duties and work claim their time. But it's been great having such cheerful assistance.

Summers are time for fun! We're embarking on a busy programme to raise money to support people living with dementia in Purbeck and raise awareness of this illness.





Springing into the National Trust!

Starting any new job can be daunting, but when I began my role with the National Trust, I was straight in at the deep end! My job is to promote all the nature conservation work the Trust, our partners and local residents are doing in Purbeck.

Springwatch shines a spotlight on Purbeck

My first week began on 29 May – which coincided with the BBC's filming of Springwatch in Purbeck. Presenter, Megan McCubbin, travelled across the area, meeting some of the organisations who are working together to protect and enhance the incredible wildlife here.

They filmed items about peregrine falcons at Corfe Castle, and bats at Winspit –

Purbeck is home to 15 of the 18 species of bat in the UK. At Studland they looked at the sand dunes, where all six of the UK's native reptiles can be found, and the seagrass meadows which are home to rare seahorses.

So what was my role in all this? I had to take photos, write posts for our social media channels, and even join other staff on 'security' duty – making sure people didn't walk into view when filming was taking place! If you missed Springwatch, you can catch up on iPlayer.

A countryside escape at Weston Farm

In my second week, I was tasked with promoting the campsite at Weston Farm, Worth Matravers. The site is re-opening under the Trust's management at the end of July. This was a happy coincidence for me because I lived in Worth for many years – and was there when the campsite was first opened!

The new campsite will be on a much smaller scale, with only 60 pitches. So there will be plenty of space for people to spread out and enjoy the panoramic views across fields and hedgerows to the sea.

Campers can also enjoy the rich wildlife of the area – which I remember well from my daily dog walks there. Skylarks sing from high above, swallows dart and dive, and brown hares dance in the fields. On summer evenings, the track down to Winspit is lit by twinkling glow-worms, and you often see ghostly barn owls swooping low over the grassland.

The site is part of a National Trust project to enhance these habitats, and work with our partners to build a bigger, better and more joined-up landscape across Purbeck where wildlife can spread and thrive.

Thankyou to all who supported our Afternoon Tea with Stalls on Saturday 10th June, when many of our community as well as visitors were able to enjoy a delicious cream tea in the beautiful garden which, thanks to our Volunteer gardener Dave, was in full bloom. Through your generosity over £1,400 was raised to improve facilities for both patients and staff.

The long awaited refurbishment of Stanley Purser ward is now complete, providing a bright environment for patients, visitors and staff. A feasibility study for our next major project – the reconfiguration of the former Day Surgery Unit - is underway and we hope to have an update on the suggested options in the next few months.

Many questions are being raised by the community in relation to the reduced opening hours of our MIU as we move into the busy Summer months. Dorset Healthcare University Trust, who manage the hospital and Community Health services, has advised that this is due to continuing extreme challenges of suitably qualified staff being available. Staff are being moved — when possible - from other MIUs to enable our MIU to stay open, albeit with reduced opening hours. **Please do phone 111 before presenting at the hospital** to ensure that your assessment and treatment is not delayed. We are continuing to work with the DHUFT Senior Managers to support a long term solution for the Opening hours.

Thankyou to those Patients who would usually attend Swanage Hospital for a routine Hearing Test and have over recent months, had to travel to Boscombe (Bournemouth) for their appointment let. Apparently, this is due to an essential piece of equipment at Swanage Hospital not functioning correctly. Now that we are aware of the problem, we have agreed to fund a replacement machine to enable the local service to resume.

Once again, a reminder that if your GP is referring you for a Specialist appointment, please ask to be referred to a Clinic at Swanage Hospital. A full list of Clinics available at the Hospital was published in last month's Newsletter.

Homes for Ukraine



Might you consider hosting a refugee from Ukraine?

Requests are still being received from families in Ukraine who have been forced to flee their homes because of the war being waged by Russia.

In addition, many refugees who have been in this country for some time are coming to the end of their stay with their current hosts and are seeking new accommodation.

Hosts initially commit to house the refugees for a period of six months. For the first six months, they receive a 'thank-you payment' of £ 350 a month, which increases to £ 600 a month from the seventh month.



Are You Scam Aware?

Scams can affect anyone, at any age, and happen online or in person. Lots of us are facing higher bills and worrying about money, and scammers are taking advantage of this.

Be suspicious of unexpected contacts and remember it might be a scam if:

- It seems too good to be true for example, a holiday that's much cheaper than you'd expect
- Someone you don't know contacts you unexpectedly
- You suspect you're not dealing with a real company for example, if there's no postal address or a sender's email address looks suspicious
- You've been asked to transfer money quickly
- You've been asked to pay in an unusual way for example, by iTunes vouchers or through a transfer service like MoneyGram or Western Union
- You've been asked to give away personal information like passwords or PINs
- You haven't had written confirmation of what's been agreed
