Wellbeing Mini Retreat on Swanage Pier Saturday 16th September 2023













TV star Nadeem Perera will be the big draw at this year's Planet Purbeck Festival. The wildlife presenter – recently seen on Springwatch and David Attenborough's Saving Our Wild Isles – will be at Swanage's Mowlem Theatre to front a lavish **Celebration of Purbeck** night. Nadeem, regarded as the biggest up-and-coming talent in wildlife broadcasting, will talk about his passionate drive to make nature accessible to all, particularly young disadvantaged people, and his groundbreaking birdwatching group Flock Together.



Continuing the TV theme, the evening will also feature the premiere of a film called **Purbeck: Let's Go Wild** especially made for the occasion by BBC and Netflix filmmaker Sue Western. She has been interviewing scores of people in the area, from five-year-olds to 85-year-olds, to find out what the word "nature" means to them. Sue said: "I have been especially blown away by the children and young people I have met. They have been so honest and wise and funny, with a clarity that is both refreshing and extremely hopeful."

The free-ticket Mowlem evening, on **September 23rd**, is the centrepiece of the ten-day festival during which Planet Purbeck will continue its twin aims of bringing people together to help nature thrive and keeping pressure on the powerful to tackle climate change.

Other highlights among a host of events to be held across the peninsula from September 15-24 include a "camp-out" at Burnbake with live music and food; a mini festival within a festival at Sandy Hill Arts in Corfe Castle, a welly-wanging competition at Norden Farmers Market and a shoreline safari at Kimmeridge, along with the traditional autumn equinox swim at Studland's South Beach.

Festival organiser Luke M Luke said Nadeem's presence and Sue's film are part of Planet Purbeck's drive to attract a wider following, particularly among young people. He added: "We are extremely excited to have Nadeem with us and I'm glad to say he was really drawn to the vibrancy and energy we are putting into the festival ... Sue's films are brilliant and we're confident there won't be a dry eye in the Mowlem when she shows her new one."

Although many of the festival's events are familiar from years past, Luke is hoping for a greater emphasis on "mass" gatherings. He said: "We want to work with our event hosts to help make new friends and connections that will ultimately play a part in Purbeck's nature recovery journey."

Wareham Area Men's Shed



A colourful new landmark has risen in Purbeck – a 14ft totem pole carved and painted by Wareham Area Men's Shed.

It stands in a picturesque glade at the Blue Pool near Wareham after a Scots pine tree was felled there for the purpose.

Twelve members of the Men's Shed stripped the trunk as it stood on chunky trestles before setting to work with chisels and gouges. Using methods pioneered by Native Canadians, they carved out stylised shapes reflecting the pole's setting at the renowned beauty spot. Over the space of three months, interpretations of an owl, grass snake, badger and sika stag gradually emerged from the wood along with a "sunshine" face and Wareham's town crest, while a sea eagle's wings and head were fashioned back at the Shed's workshop.

Once the elements were painted in traditional bright colours, and the eagle wings and head were attached, the pole was finally erected at the far end of the Blue Pool's Azalea Walk. It has already become a major attraction with most visitors stopping to take photos.

Project leader Chris Hockley said: "While we love making things for the community at the Men's Shed, such as planters and bird boxes, we felt the time was ripe for a bigger challenge – and they don't come much bigger than a 14ft totem pole!

"I knew the Blue Pool was having to fell some pine trees as part of their woodland regeneration schemes so I cheekily asked the owner, Matt Jones, if we could have one to carve as

a special project for this summer. Matt responded brilliantly by giving us two – one for practice and one for the real thing.

"We were out of our comfort zone as none of us had ever carved before. And I suppose we should have practised more than we did. But in the event, spurred on by a book we bought appropriately called Carve Your Own Totem Pole, we more or less got straight to it. We have spent a truly enjoyable summer carving and painting together in such a glorious setting.

"I hope people who see the end result will think it spectacular. I know that, personally, I am knocked out by it and can only thank some of my Shedmates who are far more skillful than me."

The Blue Pool's team of woodsmen provided logs for the eagle wings and head to be sculpted, and helped the Shedders raise the pole. Matt Jones said: "We have been delighted to work alongside Wareham Area Men's Shed and their project has been a pleasure for us, too. It was a wonderful proposal for us to receive and we are thrilled with the result.

"Totem' is derived from a word meaning 'kinship' which could not be more appropriate for this truly inspiring group of friends."



Keep the heart of Swanage beating



When we set up SCDP eight years ago we brought together a partnership of four like-minded people who wanted to see an increase in the number of public accessible defibs in Swanage and who were also linked with other local organisations.

That partnership has sustained us through those years with the original four founder members still committed members of the Steering group. We have been delighted to welcome Mary Buck to the team and to have the benefit of her knowledge and experience within SCDP, with Mary now leading our successful Familiarisation sessions. More recently Stuart Macmillan Pratt has also joined us and is helping to ensure sustainability of this important community project by supporting the organisational infrastructure of SCDP and bringing in new ideas. We have also benefited in the past from the experience of Lisa Mattei who still maintains an active interest in SCDP.

We benefited from an 'extended partnership' when we were able to borrow Defibrillator mascots from Durham Elvet Rotary Club in the North east. Sparky and Casey travelled down by courier to join us for the Swanage Carnival Parade in late July and helped us to promote SCDP and Rotary, by highlighting the role of defibrillators and their use in a fun way . Our sincere thanks to Tom Sharples from Durham Elvet who arranged delivery of the mascots but who had also had them made for promotional use - Sparky and Casey are often seen on Facebook!

On Wednesday September 13th we will be holding our Annual Meeting at 7pm at Emmanuel Baptist Church when we aim to bring together members of the SCDP team including our very important group of Defib Guardians who regularly support the monitoring and maintenance of our devices and whose support is so gratefully received.

News from Corfe Castle Parish Council

August Meeting: During the July meeting, a recommendation was put forward to not hold a full council meeting in August. After a discussion this was agreed with the proviso that should any urgent item or controversial planning applications come in then a meeting may be called. Please check our website for meeting date updates.

Correspondence: Recently the Parish Council have received correspondence regarding issues that we have no legal power to act on, or any control over. If you have any issue and do not know who to ask for help, please refer to our website www.corfecastleparishcouncil.gov.uk/useful-links. On there you will find a link to report a **missed bin collection**, report a **non-injury collision or near miss**, or report an **overgrown hedge** causing issues on the Highways / Rights of way.

Possible Pre-School merger: Corfe Castle Parish Council was made aware of a possible merger between Corfe Castle Primary School and the Corfe Castle Community Pre-School. The Parish Council has raised a number of issues in response to the consultation with the aim of ensuring that if this merger goes ahead, it will not have a detrimental effect on the community or any of the parties involved.

Highways: As you know Corfe Castle Parish Council created a "Wish List" of Highways related issues from around the Parish including signage, drop down kerbs and yellow line markings. Unfortunately, a response from the Dorset Council Transport Planning Team was not in our favour However we hope our persistence has paid off as the Dorset Council Highways Team have offered to help. The Highways Team budget is small in comparison to the Transport Planning Team's, so work will be slow, but slow and steady wins the race!

Male Incontinence: This is not a subject many will be comfortable talking about, but a subject which should not be taboo. In a recent national survey across men of all ages, it was found that more than 51% of the men surveyed, have experienced symptoms associated with urinary incontinence at some time in their life.

There is no statutory duty unlike sanitary waste bins for women, however Corfe Castle Parish Council have decided to lead the way by installing incontinence bins for both sexes within the toilet facilities.

Caretaker: Corfe Castle Parish Council have employed a Caretaker now for just over 2 years. During this time along with many other duties the Caretaker has undertaken maintenance work ensuring the longevity of our Parish Assets. However we need your help, if for example you notice a broken bench please send a quick email to the Clerk clerk@corfecastleparishcouncil.gov.uk stating the location along with a brief description of the item / issue and where possible please attach a photo.

Waste Bin Location: Corfe Castle Parish Council during the July meeting welcomed 3 members of the public, who raised a concern over the location of a waste bin. The Dorset Councillor Cherry Brooks after listening to the concerns, agreed to investigate the issue immediately.

Planning application & Treework application update: The following applications have been received by Corfe Castle Parish Council.

Application No: P/FUL/2022/07181, **Location**: Purbeck Mineral and Mining Museum Norden BH20 5DW, **Proposal**:Removal of substandard storage units and provision of welfare cabin. **Recommend** This is an application we have already commented on (Feb '23) with a comment of "No objection.". This application was escalated to be approved by Committee rather than an officer, and therefore Corfe Castle Parish Council were invited to add further comment if so wished. The most recent recommendation is still "No objection as this is for the removal of old storage containers and their replacement by a new welfare cabin. The cabin will be set on concrete pads and hence permission is required. The proposed cabin will be bottle green and therefore will blend into the surrounding vegetation."

Application No: P/ESC/2023/03598, **Location**: Wellsite Arne G, Wytch Farm, Wareham, **Proposal**: Request for EIA Screening Opinion. **Recommend**: In 2012 Perenco were granted permission to continue operations until 2027. Part of the 106 was that they would produce a decommissioning, restoration, and aftercare plan. This is that plan for wellsite G. Wellsite G is in Arne Parish and only a very small part of the pipeline connecting to the gathering station is in our parish. The plan looks very thorough. No objection



Our Summer months have passed with good news and bad news, the latter creating anxiety and upset for those patients who have been attending Wareham Hospital for their Chemotherapy treatments. With very short notice patients were told that the Wareham clinic, run by University Hospitals Dorset (UHD) was to close upon the retirement of the Advanced Clinical Practitioner, Nicky Hagger, on August 11th.

The Friends have supported this clinic from the outset by providing set -up funding and coordinating community fundraising to buy clinic equipment so were very disappointed that neither the hospital or the local GPs were told of the closure in advance. We have written to UHD (and local MPs) to request reinstatement of this very important local service which provides care for patients at their most vulnerable time.UHD has said that it will review the situation when recruitment and training has taken place and will hope

highlight the need for a Purbeck service, saving the need for patients to travel to Poole Hospital.

Our good news is that our Garden Project received positive encouragement from the South and South East Britain In Bloom Judges and we have been invited to attend RHS Wisley in late September for an awards afternoon.

We will be holding our AGM on Tuesday 19th September at 7pm at the Masonic Hall, Wareham when or speakers will be representatives from the Purbeck Hub who provide us with community services. PLEASE DO JOIN US

We are holding a Fundraiser on Saturday October 14th at the Corn Exchange, Wareham when we will be entertained by 'Ball and Socket', well known in the area. At this event we will also be drawing our raffle which will run in the hospital from late September.

The Friends continue to work hard to support Wareham Hospital and our local services and would welcome new members to the Friends and or to the Committee.

It covered some of the past, often quirky uses (abuses?) of radiation. Alan also informed us of modern uses and the paradox that radiation causes cancer but is also used to detect and treat it, plus the myths associated with radiation.

1st August Summer Lunch BBQ After much thought by the committee, it was decided to abandon the idea of erecting the marquee in the village hall grounds, due to the weather forecast, which was not brilliant. Instead, the committee, along with husbands and members erected two rows of long tables in the village hall for our meal. The Group is made up of patients registered with the Practice who have volunteered to get involved. We meet every two months - and we are always looking for new members!

The PPG last met on 11 July 2023, when Kim Gallagher updated us on Wellbeing Swanage and their exciting plans for a new Wellbeing Hub. We were also pleased to hear that Dr Gavins will be joining the Practice.

Follow Up Patient Survey

In April 2023, PPG members undertook a Follow Up Patient Survey at the Surgery. The full results were published on 12 July, together with the Practice's response - see: Follow Up Patient Survey and Practice Response.

Overall, the results of the Follow-Up Survey were much better than those of the National GP Patient Survey, undertaken in January 2022:

- 77% had found it either very easy or fairly easy to get through to the Practice on the phone
- 95% were satisfied with the appointment they were offered
- 92% described their experience of making their appointment as either very good or fairly good
- 91% felt their needs had definitely been met and another 8% felt their needs had been met to some extent
- 96% described their experience of the Practice as either very good or fairly good.

The Survey identified a number of issues that need to be addressed and the PPG made a series of recommendations for the Practice. The Practice's response sets out the actions they are now taking - or have already taken - to address the PPG's recommendations.

Practice Newsletter on Making the Best Use of Services offered by the Practice

The PPG has also worked with the Practice to produce an updated newsletter on making the best use of the services offered by the Practice - see: <u>Practice Newsletter on Making Best Use of our Services</u>.

The aim is to ensure all patients can access the services they need by providing information about all the sources of support and advice available. The newsletter includes advice and information on:

- How to keep yourself well
- How to manage a minor or self-limiting illness or health condition often referred to as Self Care
- How to choose the right NHS service to best meet your needs
- Where to seek to help if your child is unwell
- Local services you can refer yourself to.





Help with School Costs

"My children are starting new schools in September, one is in primary school and the other secondary. Between uniforms, PE kit and knowing they'll need to catch the bus each day the costs are adding up. I'm already pretty stretched, so I'm not sure how to cover these extra outgoings. Is there any help I can get?"

A new school year can put pressure on lots of people's budgets, so you're not alone in your worries. But there is help available.

A good place to start is the Citizens Advice website where you'll find lots of information on the support you might be entitled to for school-related costs.

The help you can get to cover school lunches will vary depending on how old your children are and if you claim benefits. Children in Reception, Year 1 and 2 automatically get free school meals. You can apply for free school meals for older children if you claim certain types of benefits, including Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit and Income Support. The full list is available on the <u>Citizens Advice website</u>.

You mentioned concerns about travel costs. If your child can't walk to school because of special educational needs or disabilities they should get free school transport. You may be able to get help with transport costs from your Local Education Authority if your children can't walk because it's

dangerous or too far. Your Local Education Authority is part of your local council that deals with education in your area, you can find yours on GOV.UK. Contact it directly to find out exactly what support it offers.

If you're on a low income, your Local Education Authority may also be able to help you with activity and school uniform costs. You're likely to be considered to be on a low income if you get means-tested benefits like Universal Credit or Housing Benefit. In some places there are also local charitable schemes that can help. A good place to find out about these is the school itself or Parent Teacher Association (PTA) both will usually know if these kinds of schemes exist.

A lot of people are feeling the squeeze at the moment, but it's important to remember that help is available with starting school costs and you're not alone.

Advice Bus

A reminder that the Advice Bus is at Swanage Market every Friday, 10am-12pm. It is also calling at Corfe Castle Village Hall car park every third Friday of the month 15th Sept, 20th Oct, 17th Nov.

Advisers can offer advice on a number of different issues including: benefits, debt & money, employment, energy, family, housing and legal. If you're struggling to pay your Wessex Water bills and if you're on pension credit you may be entitled to additional help. Advice is free and confidential. Please come and see us. You will always receive a warm welcome from our lovely volunteers..



Swanage Linking Lives provides two services to the residents of Swanage and the surrounding villages:

- A befriending service to those lonely, isolated and primarily older residents whereby one of our volunteers visits them at home, usually for about one hour per week, and/or has regular telephone contact with them
- A Place of Welcome (POW) at 103 High Street, Swanage on Tuesday and Thursday from 10am to 12 noon where anyone is welcome for a cup of tea and a chat or to play some board games

We are a small charity reliant on our volunteers to keep going. We currently visit 16 residents, with our home visitors all being DBS checked, and have a further three referrals awaiting a befriender. 

KEN WHARFE MVO

Former Scotland Yard Elite Royalty Protection Officer to Princess Diana, the Princes William and Harry and The Duke of Kent

Ken Wharfe was born in Canterbury Kent and joined the Metropolitan Police Service as a special cadet at the age of 17. He attained the rank of Inspector before being selected to join Scotland Yard's elite Royalty Protection Department.

The SAS trained officer was chosen to head up the security for the Queen's grandchildren, heir apparent Prince William and Prince Henry who as children, affectionately called him 'Uncle Ken'. A year later in 1987 he was appointed as Personal Protection Officer to the Princess of Wales. Princes Diana trusted him with her innermost secrets during the most traumatic years of her marriage to Prince Charles and he was at her side as she plotted to escape from what she believed was the gilded cage of the Royal Family.

His resignation in November 1993 made headline news. Just weeks later the Princess announced she was withdrawing from public life and then axed her Scotland Yard Protection, a decision her former 'Top Cop' as the British press referred to him – believes ultimately led to her death.

Just months after Princes Diana's death in Paris on August 31 1997, Inspector Wharfe was honoured by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II at Buckingham Palace and made a Member of the Victorian Order.

Until his retirement after 35 years of exemplary service with the Metropolitan Police, nearly half in the Royalty Protection Department, he was Personal Protection Officer to the Queen's cousin, The Duke of Kent.

His book 'Diana – Closely Guarded Secret' was a Sunday Times and New York Times best-seller. His second book 'Guarding Diana – Protecting the Princess around the World' was published in 2017.

Since his retirement from Scotland Yard he has entertained audiences across a broad spectrum of venues throughout the UK and abroad. Combining recent and highly relevant first hand experience of security issues, he offers credibility and independence on the highly topical subject of security.

The summer has been a strange one (not just the July weather), but I've been largely out of action after two falls resulting in a cracked hip and extensive bruising, a second cataract operation with its post-operative restrictions, and another Team Member recovering from serious surgery, with another Member having a much-awaited joint replacement last month. Not only has this put quite a strain on others in the Team, but they are taking on new responsibilities at a time when we continue to be busy. They really are community heroes, as well as good friends!

And then the freezer 'conked out' with a waste of all its contents. This was no great surprise as it was an ex-Besom freezer, so more than helped us out when we acquired it during lock-down, and has served many of our clients with frozen veg, fish fingers, and desserts (no fresh meat) and stored bread at times. We were kindly offered a replacement by Besom, but felt it better to invest in a new, frost-free tall freezer of similar size to the previous one which would have a guarantee and be delivered to us directly, installed, and the old one taken away for us.

Frozen food is purchased by SFB, and has greatly benefited clients with large families especially for whom multiple small tins are not practical. Also, households of 1 or 2 are able to use





proportions suited to their needs without waste. We are always pleased to enable clients to eliminate waste to help the environment.

So when donors ask what costs they may contribute towards (besides food and drink and household goods/toiletries), our new freezer might well be a suggestion. Food-wise, our urgent needs remain the same: tinned meat, fish, pasta sauce, savoury crackers, biscuits, desserts of all kinds and fruit juice. We're grateful for all donations, as are our clients. It's lovely to receive fresh produce from allotments, gardens, and Greengage Nursery.

And may we all enjoy an Indian summer to keep winter a step further away.

It seems we have missed the last issue, June and July was a busy month, but back with a brief update here. Hope everyone is enjoying the summer, rain or shine!



Meadow Brown Butterfly


A Glowing Report!!

The magical sight of glow-worms lighting up the fields and hedgerows was once common across the country. But populations of this fascinating beetle have seriously declined in recent years, especially in the south.



To better understand why glow-worms are declining, and improve the habitat so

they can recover, the National Trust ran a monitoring programme this summer. In conjunction with Durlston Country Park and the Purbeck Natural History Forum, we began the first step of mapping out where glow-worms are. Volunteers were each allocated a transect where they recorded sightings of both male and female glow-worms. Their findings are now being collated.



I was lucky enough to join the volunteers in Worth Matravers who were doing a transect along Winspit Road. We had to wait until it was fully dark—around I 0pm, then walk the route without torches. This made it easier to spot the glow-worms, but harder to walk without stumbling on the rough track! The darkness also played tricks on our eyes, making us see things that weren't there. We only spotted three females, but one of these was with a male—she'd obviously found the light of her life!

While working on this project, I've learned lots of fascinating facts about glow-worms. The larvae can live for up to three years, feeding on snails. But the adult beetles only live for a few weeks and don't feed at all – all their energy is spent on mating. Although the eggs, larvae and adult males all glow, it's the adult females who shine the brightest. They crawl up vegetation on warm evenings and emit their yellow-green light to attract males.

I'm looking forward to the next stages of the glow-worm project. As habitat loss and the use of pesticides are the most likely causes of their decline, we're hoping that by working with our tenant farmers and partners to manage the land in Purbeck without chemicals, these amazing creatures will have a chance to recover.

Concerns about the restructuring of our Health Services

Were you able to attend the NHS Dorset public engagement event at the Mowlem on 29th June? The event was a good opportunity to speak with staff representing Poole, Bournemouth and Dorset County acute hospitals, and Swanage Hospital, and it was good to hear about the plans. However concerns about the loss of A&E, Maternity and Children's services from Poole have not gone away, and it seems to be difficult to maintain the local services we have: the Swanage based 24/7 Ambulance Car, and the Cottage Hospital Walk-in Minor Injuries Unit, where service hours have been reduced from 8am-8pm to 9am-6pm.

Poole A&E is to be downgraded to an Urgent Treatment Centre, and we are being advised to continue to go there. However the Royal College of Emergency Medicine reports that 85% of people attending A&E need to be there, for treatment, or for A&E level diagnostics to clarify what the problem is. Due to ambulance waits, we increasingly take ourselves to hospital - how will we know where to go?

In 2019 there were 1,403 emergency admissions from BH19 postcodes (Swanage and villages) to Poole Hospital, and 1,365 emergency admissions to Poole from BH20 (Corfe, Wareham and wider Purbeck). There will be no emergency admissions to Poole Urgent Treatment Centre, and patients will face longer emergency journeys.

Questions

The Town Council, and residents, have raised a number of questions, detailed below, and the Town Council has been promised a written response.

Emergency Care

- 1) Will ambulance emergencies (adults, mums-to-be, children) be able to access daytime critical care back up at Poole Hospital once Poole A&E closes? For example, if in-hospital resuscitation is urgently needed to save life, will ambulances be able to stop at Poole?
- 2) When the new BEACH centre opens at RBH, will Swanage and Purbeck ambulance emergencies be taken there, or will they be taken to Dorset County Hospital (Dorchester)?
- 3) When will the new Emergency Department, Critical Care and Maternity services open at Bournemouth? Will Poole A&E remain open for two years after that, as previously stated?
- 4) Will the new Dorset County Emergency Department & Critical Care units be opened before A&E services close at Poole?
- 5) With Poole Maternity going, will Dorset County Special Care Baby Unit be able to support mums-to-be going into labour at 28-32 weeks, as they were able to do prior to 2017?
- 6) What support will be offered to enable South West Ambulance Service Foundation Trust to move nearer to achieving emergency response target times, including in rural areas?
- 7) How will the emergency admission system cope with no access to beds at Poole?

Where to go - Urgent Treatment, Minor Injuries and Outpatients

- 1) How will local people, who are taking themselves to hospital, know whether to go to Swanage Minor Injuries, to Poole Urgent Treatment, or to A&E in Bournemouth/Dorchester?
- 2) What will be done to return our Swanage Hospital Minor Injuries Unit Walk-in service to 8am-8pm, and to enable more outpatient clinic appointments to be held here?
- 3) What can be treated at Poole Urgent Treatment Centre that cannot be treated in the Swanage Cottage Hospital Minor Injuries Unit?
- 4) Will Poole Urgent Treatment Centre be Dr or Nurse led once Poole A&E closes?
- 5) Will any cancer treatment continue to be offered at Poole?

- Please, remember to PAY FOR PARKING ON DEPARTURE
- You will need to enter your vehicle registration number into the parking terminal.
- It should:
 - o Calculate your parking fee based on your length of stay.
 - o Apply discounts to registered Friends of Durlston FoD vehicles.
- If you have a significant problem, do report it to the duty Ranger / Counter Volunteer at the castle.

Regular (fixed day(s) of the week) volunteers vehicle registrations should be recognised by the Number Plate Recognition System. Occasionally, volunteers need report to the duty Ranger / Volunteer to ensure no parking charge is applied on each day they attend. We are aware of the FoD discount not being as generous as it ought to be and are trying to resolve this with Park With Ease.

We anticipate some "teething problems" so please bear with us.

Hopefully, this will become an improved system, for all concerned once we all adapt to it.

Might you consider hosting a refugee from Ukraine?

As Russian attacks on Ukraine continue, requests are still being received from families forced to flee their homes because of the war.

In addition, many refugees from Ukraine who have been in this country for some time are now seeking alternative accommodation.

New hosts are needed under the government 'Homes for Ukraine' scheme, with 'thank-you payments' of £ 350 to £ 600 a month.

Other refugees are seeking private rental accommodation. Dorset Council are facilitating in this with regard to deposits, guarantees and payment of rent.
