WHAT IS THE ROLE OF A TOWN COUNCILLOR?

The principal role of parish councillors (in Swanage's case, styled as town councillors) is to take collective decisions on behalf of all residents within the parish. Councillors must take great care to avoid taking decisions which reflect their own opinion only. They have a responsibility to be well-informed, and to listen to and understand the needs of different groups within the community... see more about this on the back page.

The role is without a salary, but councillors are not volunteers in a legal sense, as they are elected representatives and holders of a public office with statutory duties. Councillors in Swanage currently serve a 5-year term, reducing to 4-years from 2029 and any individuals elected at a by-election or co-opted serve until the next election. All councillors must apply the law and comply with the Member Code of Conduct. Under local government law, councillors may only vote if they are physically present at the meeting.

Councillors contribute to the work of the Council by suggesting ideas, influencing policy, engaging in constructive debate and by responding to the needs and views of the community. They comment on proposals and vote to enable the Council to make decisions.

Full Council meetings are held most months, and all councillors are expected to attend, as well as meetings of the committees on which they sit. There are six committees: Community Services, Environment and Greenspaces, Personnel, Planning and Consultation, Tourism and Local Economy and Finance and Governance. Councillors are also expected to sit on one or more of the two advisory committees, three sub-committees, as well as any of the Council's working parties and task and finish groups which are established to deal with specific matter in detail.

Councillor Mike Bonfield

Why did you want to be a Councillor?

Having been born and raised in Swanage, it has given me a deep connection to the town, though in my younger years I didn't always notice the finer details that make it so special. The Town Council stepped in to run the market in 2019 when it was at risk of closure, and thanks to the hard work of councillors, officers, and staff, it has grown into a thriving weekly event.

You'll also find tempting treats from around the world, handmade meals, and a variety of non-food stalls offering clothing, household items, books, crafts, baskets, fishing tackle, jewellery and more. LET'S TALK PUBLIC CONSULTATIONS



Over recent months, countless hours have gone into discussions, public engagement events, and council meetings focused on consultations about future planning – both from Dorset Council and Swanage Town Council. You might be thinking, “Not another one!” but consultations and surveys are essential. They give residents a real voice in shaping the best way forward for our community.

What is a Public Consultation?

A public consultation is any activity that allows local people to influence important decisions. It means listening and learning from residents before priorities are set or decisions are made. This can range from surveys to more formal processes aimed at gathering views on significant proposals that affect the community.

In some cases, councils are legally required to consult, especially on issues like planning – for example, a statutory consultation will be held next year for the Neighbourhood Plan. These statutory consultations follow strict rules under legislation, meaning the consultation process must meet certain standards of fairness, transparency and proper consideration of residents' views. But beyond legal obligations, consultation is simply the right thing to do. Engagement is at the heart of democracy after all.

Consultations from Swanage Town Council this year include:

- Green Seafront Scheme (currently under analysis)
- Neighbourhood Plan
- Corporate Plan 2026-2030 (coming soon...)

As councillors, it's our responsibility to consult with residents before making the big decisions that shape our town and community. Public consultations can be challenging, time-consuming, and costly, but they are essential for Swanage's future. Please engage with us at the Town Hall and contribute positively to the conversation. WHAT IS A NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN?

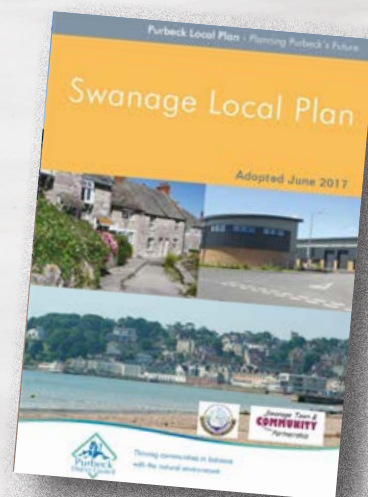
A Neighbourhood Plan is a statutory planning document prepared by the local community, which sets out policies and priorities for land use and development within a defined area. Once adopted, it becomes part of the Development Plan for the Dorset Council area and must be considered in planning decisions.

The Swanage Neighbourhood Plan will: reflect the community's vision for the town, support sustainable growth, protect valued green spaces and heritage assets, encourage well-designed development, help deliver new community facilities and promote climate change mitigation.

Why now and what's next?

The existing Swanage Local Plan, adopted in 2017, only covers the period to 2027. With Dorset Council preparing a new Dorset Local Plan, it is timely to develop a Neighbourhood Plan that ensures Swanage's specific needs and aspirations are represented in future planning decisions.

Feedback from this autumn's informal engagement will inform the next stage of formal consultation, during which the Draft Plan will be shared with the community and statutory consultees early in the New Year. Following this, the Plan will be revised, submitted for independent examination, and ultimately subject to a local referendum.
